

Wildlife Reserve At Moore Park Considered By City Council; Canal Fence Eyed

Petitions will soon be circulated as the major step in making Moore park a wildlife reserve. The city council Monday night okayed a park commission recommendation regarding the move. Mayor Ed Ostendorf, reporting for the commission, stated that state officials favor the project and as soon as petitions are signed they will be sent to the state game commission for final approval.

The mayor said that the reserve will probably take in the area from the park to the Geary ranch around the Upper lake. The step is being taken, he added, to prevent shooting of game in and around the park.

The city's alleys came in for comment, with councilmen urging property owners to clean out rubbish and debris in their alleys with the promise that as soon as alleys are cleared the city will scrape and grade them as a primary step in cleaning up Klamath Falls. The project applies to both business and unimproved residential alleys, the mayor said.

Phil Hitchcock has been appointed chairman of a committee to study the possibility of fencing the canal. The city hopes to get the cooperation of the bureau of reclamation in securing fencing from the Tulelake relocation center. The project has been attempted numerous times in past years.

Henry E. Perkins, city attorney, was granted a 30-day leave of absence for a vacation trip in Missouri, and taking his place is D. E. Van Vactor, former city attorney. The council asked Van Vactor to look into the state bill regulating airport zoning to find out what the city can do to protect its property at the municipal field. He will report next Monday.

Mayor Ostendorf made another announcement regarding the closing

proposal on streets leading into the site of the proposed north entrance route. A public meeting will be called as soon as plans are received from the state highway department, he said.

City Attorney Perkins turned over an insurance company check for \$357.96 to pay for damages on the fire truck, which resulted from an accident some months back.

On the recommendation of Building Inspector Walt Salsbery, the council authorized Police Judge Harold Franey to advertise for bids to repair the leaky roof on the city hall.

In a planning commission report, property owners north of the railroad tracks in the S. 6th area were invited to joint property owners on the south side in their recently-established lighting district.

The city agreed to raise the curbing along certain parts of Melrose street where water and debris washes onto property above the curb. Cost of the repair will be about \$100, City Engineer E. A. Thomas said.

The short and peaceful session closed with reading of resolutions and ordinances, including a resolution setting the date of the hearing on the S. 7th street improvement plan for July 7 at 7:30 p. m.

GI Insurance Deadline Nears

Less than eight weeks remain for veterans to reinstate lapsed GI insurance without a physical examination, Patrick W. Kilby, veterans administration representative for this area, pointed out today.

Already in the past four months,

3284 Oregon ex-service men and women have revived \$20,518,000 worth of national service life insurance, the VA aide stated.

Applications for NISLI reinstatement without a physical can be accepted only through August 1, he warned. Up to that date, the veteran need only make a statement that his health is as good now as it was when his GI insurance lapsed.

Ships Seized By Chinese Police

NANKING, June 10 (AP)—Mukden dispatches to Chinese newspapers said today that two fishing ships of a "certain nation" had been seized by Chinese authorities while operating in Chinese territorial waters in Manchuria.

The report said local officials had asked the central government to handle the incident. Chinese correspondents usually use the term "a certain nation" when referring to Russia, but the newspaper Peace Daily reported that the executive Yuan was told Japanese were continuing to fish in waters around Formosa and elsewhere in Chinese waters.
