

Donald L. Golding Named Principal Of Riverside Elementary School Today

Donald L. Golding, mathematics instructor at Klamath Union high school, was appointed principal of Riverside elementary at a joint meeting of the school boards Monday night. Golding replaces Darrell Potter who goes to Roosevelt as principal, filling the vacancy left by the resignation of Edmund Attebury. Golding has had previous experience as principal in Iowa high schools before coming to Klamath Falls in 1935. He has been with KUHS from 1935 to 1941, when he entered the navy. He received his indoctrination course at Columbia university, New York, and taught ordnance and gunnery at midshipman's school there, moving later to Ohio State university as assistant executive officer and battalion commander at the navy's recognition training assignment. His next assignment was in NROTC at the University of

South Carolina and from there went to Washington, D. C. in the services section. His last post with the navy was at Bremerton, Wash., where he worked as education services officer and held an assignment in civil adjustment. The newly named principal held the rank of lieutenant commander in the navy. He is head of naval reserve organization here. Golding is a graduate of Coe college, Iowa, and received his master of arts degree at Columbia university. Resignations Taken Resignation of several instructors was accepted by the boards last night. Stephen R. Mosher of the junior high staff has accepted a position with West-Hitchcock Corp., Grace K. Rhoades, first grade teacher at Roosevelt, resigned to be married, and Connel Napier, sixth grade teacher at Riverside, has accepted a teaching post at Eugene. Mrs. William Brinsenden is retiring from the teaching field. District No. 2 board accepted the resignation of Helen Stine who will take over duties as Klamath county home demonstration agent. Mrs. Paul O. Landry gave her annual report on cafeteria operations in the schools. The boards agreed to aid in housing the Kitsilano Boys band from Vancouver, B. C. Jack R. Kennamer, recently graduated from Southern Oregon College of Education at Ashland, will take over boys physical education and coaching at Fremont junior high. It was announced by Supt. Arnold L. Gralapp, Charles McLin has been released from elementary assignment and will report to KUHS this fall for general science and coaching work.

Jupiter, Giant Of Planets Puts On Show During June

Hardly has the twilight arch of early June dimmed the southeastern heavens, when there appears loss of this darkening curtain a little dot of yellow light. It gradually becomes brighter, and is a splendid object by the time the sky is dark. This is Jupiter, the giant planet of the solar system and the brightest of all star-like objects now in the evening sky. About five degrees from Jupiter (west and above) there is a little star, Zubenelgenubi by name. In 1935 the two stood so near each other for weeks that a young sky student near Burns, Oregon, referred to the dainty little star as "Jupiter's wife." This column stated at that time that although Jupiter had been true to his little star goddess all summer, he soon must move eastward around the sky. "Little Zubenelgenubi will be left alone, for Jupiter will not complete the circle of the sky and again get into this locality for 12 years." The 12 years are now ended and the planet has made a complete trip around the sun. Because of a temporary retrograde motion, Jupiter will be nearer the little star in July than at present. Then another 12-year separation will start.

In ancient mythology, Jupiter was the king of the gods, and ruler of heaven and earth. It was he who hurled thunderbolts at objects of his wrath and caused rain to fall upon the earth. We still make reference to the last-named attribute when we speak of "Jupiter Pluvius." Astronomically, Jupiter is larger than all the other planets combined, and has a mass of one-thousandth that of the sun. Its diameter is 11 times that of the earth. This planet is the fifth in distance outward from the sun, the earth being third. Jupiter's satellite system consists of 11 known moons, which encircle it in periods ranging from 12 hours for the closest to two years for the most distant. Jupiter is a most interesting sight even in small telescopes. With moderate powers, the globe appears about the size that our moon does to the unaided eye. Across the yellow surface, faint dark bands of ir-

Eisler Guilty Of Contempt

WASHINGTON, June 10 (AP)—Gerhart Eisler, alleged No. 1 communist leader in this country, was convicted today of contempt of Congress. The federal court jury deliberated only 20 minutes before returning the verdict, which carries a maximum penalty of a \$1000 fine and four months to a year imprisonment. Judge Alexander Holtzoff set June 27 for sentencing. Eisler was indicted on contempt charges for allegedly refusing to be sworn in for testimony before the house committee on un-American activities. He contended the committee refused to let him read a prepared statement before administering the oath. Passing Through — Mrs. C. S.
