Kearns Quits Forest Service Position

Word has been received by the Medford district office of the O. & C. administration, bureau of land management, of the resignation of Richard S. Kearns, assistant chief forester, Portland, Oregon.

Mr. Kearns, whose resignation became effective on June 6, has been in charge of the timber management and timber sales section of the O. & C. administration since 1940. He resigned his position with the bureau of land management to enter into private forestry work with the firm of Mason, Bruce and Girard, Portland, Oregon.

Lewis Named In Suit

E. G. Lewis, operator of the Lewis Music company, 2442 Shasta way, is named in a law suit filed here by the state unemployment commission for collection of unpaid payroll assessments covering 1946 and most of 1945.

The amount asserted due the state, 27 per cent of the Lewis payroll of \$20,843.04 for nine months of 1945, and all of 1946, is \$562.77. The state asks interest and penalties making the total \$658.17.

The complaint charges that Lewis' business included handling of juke boxes and pinball machines and that he was employing more than four persons during the period mentioned, making him liable for state unemployment act assessments.
