

USBR Funds For Projects Gets Okeh

WASHINGTON, June 11 (AP)—Chairman Wherry (R-Neb.) of a senate appropriations subcommittee said today it has decided to give the reclamation bureau enough money to carry on its major construction projects in the year beginning July 1 at approximately the same rate as in the last 12 months.

The committee completed its draft of the interior department's annual appropriation bill last night, Wherry said, adding it will be presented to the main appropriations committee Friday.

Without giving figures on the various projects involved, Wherry told a reporter: "We have increased the funds for all of the major construction projects to permit the work going on next year at approximately the same rate as in this year."

"We had to increase the bill approximately \$30,000,000 to give the department the same amount the house believed it was giving it."

"In addition, we made additions for continuing the work on Central valley in California, the Colorado-Big Thompson project in Colorado, the Bonneville power administration, Grand Coulee and Columbia basin in Washington and the Missouri basin project."

The committee felt that since these projects are under construction they should not be slowed down.

The house cut all these projects sharply. Department officials have said some of the projects might have to be closed down unless the senate voted them more money.

Wherry said the committee decided to recommend a requirement that the Alaska railroad continue its service to Seward, Alaska, for at least two years.

Cleaning Shop To Open Soon

TULELAKE, June 11—Two ex-service men, both with five years service in the army air corps in the Asiatic-Pacific theater in the last war, will open a dry cleaning establishment here about July 15. They are J. C. Wahl and M. W. Mack, both of Tulelake.

The new enterprise will be established in a pumice tile building now under construction in the new addition on Main street and according to a representative of the state fire marshal's office, Sacramento, the structure exceeds the maximum requirements for safety. The business will be known as the M & W Cleaners.

One half of the structure will be used by Elmer Jones, Tulelake veteran, who was wounded in the service. He will operate a refrigeration business. Present quarters occupied by Jones in the Tulelake Tire shop were damaged recently by fire.

Chiloquin Boat Builder Has Happy Life In Shop

Swarms of men working at designing and drawing numerous blueprints, welding immense sheets of steel, covering thousands of square yards with paint, rushing to and from jobs in acres of shipyards at the sound of picture visualized at mention of boat building, a visit to the shop of Chiloquin's Henry J. Kaiser, John H. Lott, would prove thoroughly disillusioning.

Working from plans designed according to the intended use of the boat, fashioning and fitting his materials of oak and pine and plywood, the Chiloquin builder works unhurriedly, apparently intent on making every move count, as he goes about building staunchness, maneuverability and seaworthiness into whatever trim-lined small craft he may have under construction.

Build a better mousetrap and the world will beat a path to your door. Mebbe so. Build a better boat and sports-minded folk for some little distance around will be in to see how it's done. This John has demonstrated. And it works to his advantage. Seldom does he solicit an order. Then, too, working with at most two helpers, let a heavy lifting job come up and the chances are he will have a gallery of on-lookers present to impress into service.

"So you want to know about me?" queried the designer-builder, shifting the ever-present cigar to one corner of his mouth. "I'm 44, busy, and heepped," this last with a grin at his wife, Helga, who was lending a hand on a paint job and whose hair had a faint greenish tinge from too close an exposure to the business end of a spray gun. Lott didn't act abused.

According to him, boatbuilding is simple. Plywood is cut with the band or skill saw and curved to the desired shape. With the foundation pieces arranged on a stand, an electric drill is used to make hundreds of small holes for the brass screws, which later are inserted deftly at high speed. As a part of the finishing touches, a sanding machine readies the surface for its makeup, which is applied by a small electric spraying apparatus. Nothing to it.

A background of interest in boats came naturally for John. At Skamawakan, Washington, on the lower Columbia, where he spent his formative years, the river was everything. There were no highways and but few

country roads. When a Skamawakan wished to leave town he was restricted to a choice of going by boat, or swimming. John's first job was on a seining ground, driving a team of horses which hauled in the nets. Later he ran a launch and still later put in several seasons as a gillnetter. Fishing and boat-building have been a lifelong favorite twosome, although an allied sport of boating almost proved his downfall.

One summer day Mrs. Lott took over the outboard motor while her husband skinned along behind balanced on a surfboard. "I had forgotten to tell her how to slow the boat down," related John. "She started testing to see if she could figure it out. She figured it, all right. It didn't slow down. It stopped. But I didn't. I sailed through the air—" but apparently not like the man on the flying trapeze.

John established residence in Chiloquin in 1927 and soon married a young second generation Norwegian teacher, Helga Tellevik, who has continued in the local school system until recently. Building boats for himself was a pleasurable pastime during the years Lott spent as barber, running a shoe shop and cleaning establishment, and in the mill.

Only during the last two years has he done commercial construction. Two recent inboard designs have been his most ambitious jobs to date. One 22-foot long with an 8-foot beam and finished with clear varnish and white paint, necessitated an enlargement of his shop to its present 16 x 24-foot dimensions.

John works from four to 14 hours a day, depending upon the size and urgency of his backlog of orders. Wanting materials from reluctant dealers has been a headache but that situation is improving. A constant companion about the premises is a large, well-trained hunting dog with a watchdog complex and a disconcerting voice.

The Lotts have just returned from an Alaskan vacation trip which tied in closely with boats and boating, and are planning a future of continued boatbuilding.
