Dr. Crown H. Hinshaw, consultant in medicine and research for Mayo Brothers clinic and vice president of the National Tuberculosis association, will be the main speaker at the conference to be held in San Francisco, June 15-20.

The Trudeni Society of Doctors will also meet in San Francisco on these dates.

Mrs. Thirza De Cew, executive secretary for the Klamath County Public Health association, will attend both meetings. On her return she will start the wheels rolling for the annual visit of the mobile X-ray unit, and for the Christmas seal sale.

The mobile unit's visit to Klamath Falls has been tentatively set for September and everyone is urged to plan to have the free chest X-ray taken at that time. Mrs. De Cew advises that although chest pictures taken last year may have been negative, any number of contacts with tubercular persons may have been made during the past year and an X-ray picture this year may show positive signs of the disease which can be effectively checked if recognized in its early stages.

Christmas seals will go on sale in November and it is the purchase of these that make it possible to carry on an active campaign against the "white plague" which still takes a tremendous yearly toll of health and lives, the public health secretary emphasized.
