PORTLAND, June 11 (AP)—Arthur H. Olson, 61, former deputy state superintendent of Banks, died at his home here yesterday.

He came to Portland in 1918, for a time was associated with the State Bank of Portland, then took the position with the state banking department which he held for 22 years. At the time of his death

he was vice president and general manager of the Commercial Bank of Tillamook, which he helped organize several years ago.

Survivors include the widow and three sisters. Funeral services will be held here Saturday.

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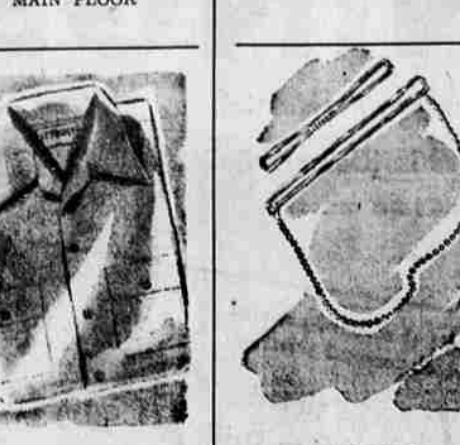
