

Redbirds Leave National Cellar

Cardinals Trip Phils 8-3 To Slide Into Seventh Place Ahead Of Pittsburgh Pirates

"One down and six to go!" was the new St. Louis Cardinal battle cry today.

"We've just about found ourselves," St. Louis Manager Eddie Dyer jubilantly exclaimed last night after the world champion Redbirds ex-cavated themselves from the cellar for the first time in nearly two months. The grand and glorious world series winners had spent 81 consecutive days in the National League basement.

The Cards' long awaited rise came about when they defeated the Phillies in Philadelphia 8-3 in a night game to move into seventh place a game ahead of the Pittsburgh Pirates who lost to the Giants in New York 3-2.

Dyer pointed out they were within five points of fifth place, "and once we get there—which may be after today's game—we will have only four more clubs to overtake. A difficult task but not impossible."

However, the Cards were still seven and a half games from first place as the front running Giants opened up a one-game lead on the field with a thrilling 12-inning victory over the Pirates. Brooklyn and Boston were deadlocked for second place as the Dodgers lost undisputed possession of the runner-up spot by splitting a doubleheader with Cincinnati, winning the first, 6-5 after losing the opener 3-1. Boston caught the Brooks by nipping the Cubs 2-1.

The New York Yankees pulled within a half game of Detroit's American league leading Tigers by defeating the Chicago White Sox 5-3 while the Bengals were being outslugged 9-8 by the Philadelphia Athletics. Boston continued in a third place deadlock with the A's by noosing out the Cleveland Indians 3-2 and the St. Louis Browns left the cellar in favor of Washington by dumping the Senators 2-0.

All games were played at night except those in Brooklyn and Boston and in Detroit in a twilight game was the attraction.

Third Baseman Billy Rigney was the Giant hero as the bespectacled third baseman knocked in all his team's runs including the deciding marker in the 12th with a squeeze bunt that scored Lloyd Gearhart from third base. He homered in the fifth with Buddy Kerr on base.

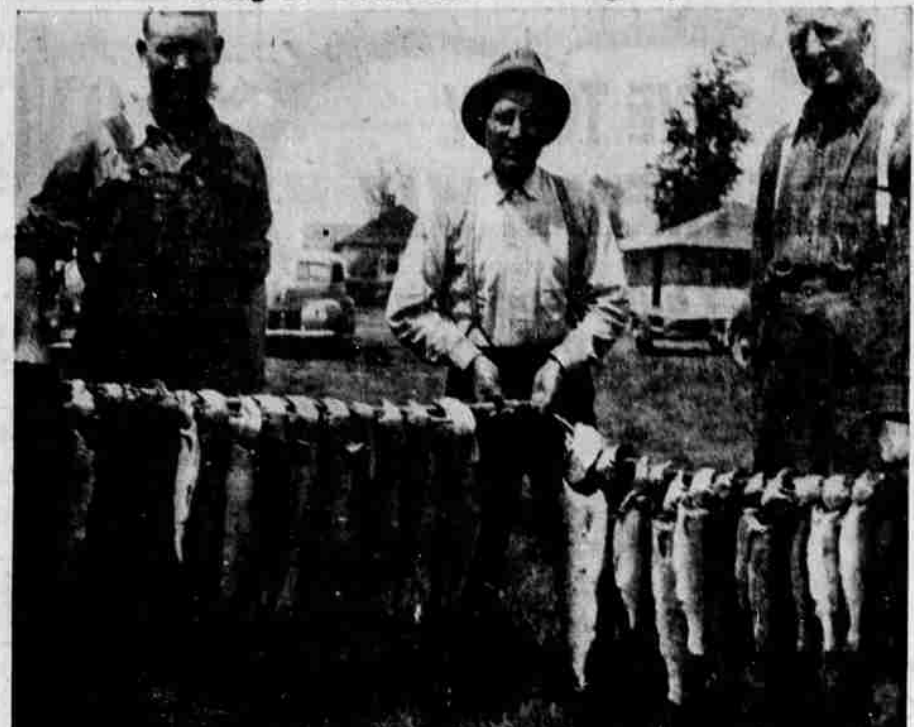

TANFORAN OFFICIALS MUST STAND TRIAL

SAN FRANCISCO, June 11 (AP)—Tanforan race track and its officials yesterday failed to obtain dismissal of criminal indictments accusing them of disregarding building priorities in postwar construction at the track this spring.

As a result, the track corporation and four officials go on trial next Monday in federal court on 12 counts of violating the second war

powers act for allegedly ignoring materials priorities of the civilian production administration, and a 13th count of conspiracy.

Denial of the track's motion to dismiss the indictments was given from the bench by Federal Judge Dal J. Lemmon at the conclusion of two days of arguments.

There was no reason, Judge Lemmon said, why Tanforan "should not be bound by (CPA) regulations just the same as all the rest of us are bound."

In addition to the Tanforan company, those indicted by a federal grand jury are Track President Guy M. Standifer, Treasurer and General Manager William J. Levin; General Contractor Earl W. Heple, and Project Superintendent A. W. Barnewitz.

If convicted, the defendants face penalties of one year in jail and \$10,000 fine on each of the 12 counts, and two years and \$10,000 on the conspiracy charge.

Grid Schedule For Four Year Period Drawn

Semi-Pro Baseball Code Loosened Some

SUN VALLEY, Ida., June 11 (AP)—Adoption of a four-year football schedule, from 1948 to 1951, was the major business before the Pacific coast conference today as faculty heads, athletic directors, coaches and others prepared to clean up remaining items on the agenda of the annual spring meeting.

The schedule, already drawn up, was expected to receive final approval from the faculty athletic representatives.

In sessions yesterday, the conference set a limit of 37 players for traveling football squads, except for distances under 50 miles, revised the code to permit college students to play summer baseball in the company of semi-pros without losing intercollegiate eligibility and voted to participate in the National Collegiate Athletic association's plan to raise \$10,000 for the 1948 U. S. Olympic team. Football traveling squads prior to the war were unlimited in number.

The conference also decreed that visiting football teams must wear white jerseys except by mutual agreement with the home team and that home basketball squads must be garbed in white apparel.

The 1948 conference basketball championship dates were set for March 12, 13 and 15. The playoff automatically will be held in the southern division Oregon State having won the title in the north last winter.

Revision of the code to permit summer baseball competition for the students was considered a tonic for the collegiate life of game. Under the old ruling, loss of amateur status resulted if collegians appeared in games with semi-professionals. The new ruling reads that students may play in the summer on any baseball team not under the jurisdiction of the national baseball commissioner provided they do not accept compensation for playing.

The conference also standardized glass backboards for conference basketball courts. Such equipment will be installed at the four southern members, Stanford, Southern California, California and California at Los Angeles. Northern schools have used them for years.
