

Crisis In Bulgaria

New Communist Blow Ousts Core Of Opposition From Bulgar Parliament

A new communist blow to non-communists in southeastern Europe—expulsion of the hard core of the opposition from Bulgaria's parliament—was presented to the world today amid growing indications that a Balkan showdown was impending between Russia and the West.

An authoritative source in Washington said the United States was reviewing the whole American policy in southeastern Europe to determine what lines of future action might be more effective than the long series of futile protests sent to Moscow and other communist capitals in the past few years.

Diplomatic authorities in Washington were predicting freely that "Russia either would reject or try to hamstring American demands for a Big Three inquiry into the communist seizure of power in Hungary, and that, in either event, the United States in all probability would carry the case to the United Nations."

Assemblymen Out
The Bulgarian parliament voted last night that 22 members of Nikola Petkov's Agrarian party had resigned of their own volition and therefore "are no longer members of the grand national assembly."

The parliament acted on information from a government prosecutor that the written resignations of the 23 had been found in Petkov's private papers, but the deputies, insisting this simply was routine party practice, declared in final pleas that "we do not resign."

Petkov, general secretary of the Agrarian party, is under arrest on charges of conspiring against the state. His arrest was the subject of a sharp statement by the U. S. state department yesterday which said that in trying Petkov, Bulgaria herself would go before the bar of world opinion.

Appeal to U. N.
The United States laid the foundation for an appeal to the U. N. in a vigorous protest to the Soviet commander in Hungary, charging "flagrant interference in Hungarian internal affairs and demanding a joint inquiry by Britain, the United States and the Soviet Union."

Some state department officials saw the issue as much broader than a Balkan one. They expressed the opinion that it might be raised also in Greece, Italy, France, Germany and wherever else the western powers conflict with communism.

The U. N. subcommittee observing Greece's current troubles was reported today to have abandoned attempts to get into Bulgaria to investigate Greek charges that anti-government Greek guerrillas received help from that country.

An informed source said on the first attempt armed Bulgarian guards stopped the group at the border, and on the second the Bulgarians insisted upon a number of hamstringing restrictions.

Construction Bonds Get Okay
TACOMA, June 12 (AP)—Superior Judge Ernest M. Card ruled today that the port of Tacoma has authority to issue revenue bonds for construction of a new plant for the Centennial Flouring Mill company to replace the \$2,500,000 plant destroyed in January.

The commissioners based their authority for the revenue bonds on a 1941 war emergency act which permits financing of projects necessary for increased waterfront facilities.

Under terms of the agreement with the milling company, the bonds will be liquidated without cost to taxpayers through rentals paid during a 30-year issue period.

The case was brought before Judge Card in a friendly test action by Frank T. Callender, a local property owner.

1 cup flour
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup boiling water
1 lb. round steak

2 tablespoons hot shortening
1/2 cup boiling water
1/2 cup Fat Milk

Mix together flour, salt and pepper. Pound into both sides of round steak. Brown on both sides in skillet in hot shortening. Add boiling water. Cover tightly; cook very slowly 1 hour, or until tender. Remove steak to hot platter; keep hot. Stir milk into liquid remaining in skillet. Heat slowly, but do not boil. Pour over the steak. Serve with stuffed baked potatoes and creamed peas. Makes 4 servings.
