

Swedish Man Killed By Red Soldier

VIENNA, June 12 (AP)—Russian soldiers fired on a Swedish relief mission car last night and killed Arne Carlsson, Vienna chief of the Swedish Save-the-Children organization.

A Swedish legation spokesman here described the shooting as a deplorable accident, and said no protest would be lodged with the Russians in Vienna. He added that a full report would be sent to the Swedish foreign office.

Carlsson was killed by a rifle shot fired by a Russian sentry near the Czechoslovak border. Dr. Thorsten Arneus, chief of the Swedish relief mission to Austria, was injured slightly in the right hand by flying glass.

Carlsson's wife and three-year-old son, riding in the back seat, escaped injury.

A legation official said Carlsson was en route from Hungary to Czechoslovakia. At a Russian roadblock he turned the car around, then started back when the Russian soldier shot from behind the roadblock.

The Russian soldier later said he had shouted for the car to stop before firing. Dr. Arneus said no occupant of the car heard any shouts or had any reason to believe they should have stopped.

Carlsson's body was returned to Vienna this morning. He was about 35.

Gas Price Probe Slated

WASHINGTON, June 12 (AP)—Attorney General Tom C. Clark said today a federal grand jury at Los Angeles will investigate increased gasoline prices in the Mountain states and Pacific coast area for evidences of monopolistic activity.

Clark said that since price control on gasoline was removed last July, average prices in those areas have gone up approximately three cents a gallon.

"Since a comparatively small number of companies occupy a predominant position in the two areas," Clark said, "considered action to restrict competition may place in the hands of a few companies the power to fix monopolistic and non-competitive prices on the sale of gasoline."

John Bonnett, assistant attorney general in charge of the anti-trust division, said he has received complaints that price increases by competing oil companies were identical and simultaneous.

Commission Upholds Liquor Suspension

PORTLAND, June 12 (AP)—The 30-day suspension of the license of the Blue Ox bar at Timberline lodge was upheld by the state liquor commission yesterday despite a plea on personal problems made by the management.

E. V. Burns, one of the lodge directors, said there has been continuous trouble with help since the war. The suspension was given for sale of liquor by bartenders.

Burns suggested it might help if the lodge were made a liquor sales agency, reducing temptation for employees to bootleg. The nearest sales agency now is 23 miles distant.

Highway Booth Called Success

PORTLAND, June 12 (AP)—The new highway booth information service for western migrant workers is "very promising," crop workers

supervisors concluded in a two-day discussion meeting.

In the first-day session yesterday, Bernard Joy of Washington, D. C., assistant deputy director of extension in the farm labor program, said that at the Biggs, Ore., station, migrants from 23 states were aided in one month.

Joy added that Oregon and Washington farmers have shown marked improvement in housing facilities and fair employment offered migrants.

He said agricultural appropriation cuts would not affect the farm labor program.

Truman Asks Control On Credits

WASHINGTON, June 12 (AP)—President Truman recommended today that congress pass a bill permitting continuance of controls on consumer credit in peacetime.

Unless congress does this, Mr. Truman said he plans to end the present regulations, based on wartime legislation. These regulations, under executive order, fix the size of down payments and fix the length of time in which the balance due must be paid by installments.

These controls affect purchases of such things as household goods, refrigerators and automobiles.

Mr. Truman's views were stated in a letter to Mr. E. C. Eccles, chairman of the federal reserve board, which wields the controls on installment-buying credit. Eccles read the letter to the house banking committee.

Measure Asked

Eccles has asked the committee to pass a measure giving the reserve board power to continue operation

of controls in peacetime. Mr. Truman's letter said:

"I hope that the congress will enact the necessary legislation to retain restraints upon excessive expansion which results in excessive contraction of consumer credit thereby making for economic instability, reduced production and unemployment."

"If the congress does not see fit to provide the necessary legislative

authority, it is my intention to vacate the executive order because I do not believe that such regulations should rest indefinitely in peacetime on emergency or war powers after the congress has had ample opportunity to consider the subject."
