WCTU Head Sees Prohibition Again

ASHBURY PARK, N. J., June 12 (AP)—Mrs. D. Leigh Colvin of Evanston, Ill., president of the National Woman's Christian Temperance Union, says the United States is headed back to national prohibition.

Addressing the opening session yesterday of a two-day meeting of the National WCTU, Mrs. Colvin said the nation was now in an organized "revolt against alcoholic beverages."

"One-quarter of the area of the United States, containing 28,000,000 population, is now dry or bans hard liquor," she said, predicting that "eventually entire states will go dry and ultimately the nation."

Bill Cissell Keeping Arcs On White Sox

Ex-Chicago Shortstop Now An Electrician

CHICAGO, June 12 (NEA)—Chasmer William Cissell, the man who tends to the lights at Comiskey park, is the man for whom the white Sox turned loose the largest amount of money that the American League season club ever spent on a ballplayer.

Bill Cissell was a red-hot infielder for the Portuano Beavers of the Pacific Coast league back in 1927, when the late Charles A. Comiskey laid out \$75,000 in cash plus various bonuses with an aggregate worth of \$48,000 for him.

That \$125,000 is an all-time high for the Pale Hose, and Cissell now is classed on the Comiskey payroll as an electrician instead of a shortstop.

At 44 years old, slender and still abnormally built with only a little gray in his hair, Cissell works around the park all week and plays semi-pro ball for \$25 a game on Sundays. He's worth it, too.

While hardly a flop in four years with the Sox, the ex-Beaver never quite attained stardom. He was a fancy fielder but his batting was nothing to keep headline writers busy, although in 1932 he went to the Cleveland Indians and hit .315 in 140 games as a second baseman.

The arrival of the imperishable Luke Appling on the White Sox roster started Cissell on his way. In 1931, when Cissell hit only .229, Appling laid claim to the job, and is still holding it.

Bill played a while with Connie Mack's Athletics, then sort of drifted out. With his natural talent he should have gone far in baseball, but those who knew him best in his days as a player say he steadfastly refused to let the game interfere with his pleasure.

Bobby Locke Tabbed As Fellow To Beat In Open

ST. LOUIS, June 12 (AP)—They tee off today in golf's most grandiose show, the 47th United States Golf association Open with South African Bobby Locke slightly favored to mow down 165 tense rivals on the short but deceptive St. Louis country club course.

Mustachioed, 150-pound Lloyd Mangrum was defending his title in this 72-hole blue ribbon scramble, but the fellow to beat obviously was the red-hot importation from Johannesburg, South Africa, Arthur D'Arcy (Bobby) Locke.

Cloudy weather with occasional thunderstorms was predicted as the phalanx of golf's big and little shots swarmed over the snug, narrow par-71 course which has plenty of trouble lurking in a 6532-yard meander.

Locke, 29, winner of \$8437 and four titles in seven U. S. meets within two months, was the favorite although Mangrum, leading PGA money winner, Jimmy Demaret and Ben Hogan also got respectable nods from the bet makers.

The quest for a slice of a \$10,000 purse (for professionals) and the tradition-steeped championship call for 18 holes today and tomorrow, when the field will be trimmed to 60, and 36-hole windup Saturday.
