

Staff Ready For Kickoff Of City's Largest Summer Recreation Lineup Monday

Staff members have been appointed, schedules set, and all is in readiness for the city's largest summer recreation program in many years, slated to get under way Monday, June 16.

Playgrounds and arts and crafts instruction will be offered at four elementary schools in the city system, Fremont, Mills, Pelican and Roosevelt, with the main recreation center and swimming program at Klamath Union high school.

Playground registration will be at individual schools, with registration for woodworking and swimming at the high school with the exception of children in the Pelican school district who will register at their school.

Duck Refuge Buying Okeh

WASHINGTON, June 12 (AP)—A house merchant marine subcommittee approved today a bill by Rep. Lee (D-Calif.) to authorize the federal government to purchase lands for duck feeding areas in California.

The bill would permit the fish and wildlife service to buy up to 20,000 acres in scattered tracts throughout the agricultural areas of the state provided the state buys an equal amount for the same purpose.

The areas would be planted in rice and grain. Ducks would be herded by airplanes into the feeding zones. The purpose is to keep the ducks, which winter in the thousands in California, from devouring commercial crops of rice, lettuce and other edibles.

The state has set aside \$750,000 for its share of the program. The federal contribution would be about the same.

Subs Plan Arctic Trip

PEARL HARBOR, June 12 (AP)—Four Pacific fleet submarines and a tender will leave Pearl Harbor in mid-July for a two-month training cruise into Arctic waters, submarine force headquarters said yesterday.

The vessels will cruise in the Bering and Chukchee seas and may go as far north as Point Barrow ice cap, headquarters said.

This will be the second postwar submarine cruise into the area. Four submarines made the trip last year without a tender. This year the vessels are expected to visit Adak, Kodiak, Seward and Juneau.

The vessels will be the tender Nerus and the submarine Bearfish, based at San Diego, and the Cabezon, Calman and Kand Chub, based here.

State Fair Space Request Pile Up

SALEM, June 12 (AP)—Demand for concession space at the Oregon state fair, which opens September 1, has broken all records, Fair Manager Leo Spitznagel said today.

He said the entire space allotted to food and drink dispensers already has been rented.

The annual list of livestock and agricultural premiums will be ready in a few days. About \$50,000 in premiums will be awarded at the fair.

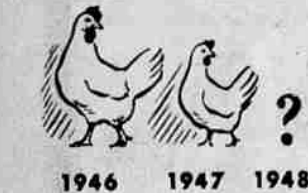
Fire Destroys Honolulu Hangar

HONOLULU, June 12 (AP)—A roaring fire destroyed the main nose hangar and two transport planes at Honolulu airport Tuesday night.

Unofficial estimates placed the loss at \$1,000,000 or more. Flames destroyed equipment, machinery and plane parts as well as a Navy C-54 "Skymaster" and a trans-Pacific Airlines DC3.

One firefighter was treated for minor injuries in the only reported casualty.

The fire started in a corner of the 200-yard long wooden hangar used by Pan-American, United and Trans-Pacific Airlines. The cause was not immediately determined.

Meter Trial Period Nears End; Election Delay Eyed

The six-month trial period on parking meters will be up on July 25, but a suggestion has come from the city budget committee to hold off voting on the fate of the meters until fall.

The committee feels that by voting on the meters in the state October 7 balloting, the expense of a special election will be avoided. Expenses involved in a special vote would be in the neighborhood of \$3000.

The meters were installed by the city on the condition that after six months voters would decide whether or not to keep them.

Two-hour parking meters have been ordered by the city to replace the one-hour clocks now in use in sections of town which are not extensively used for parking.

Mayor Ed Ostendorf announced that the areas where the new meters will be installed are Pine street from 4th to 5th and 10th to 11th, and Klamath avenue, from 4th to 5th and 9th to 11th.

The same price system will apply to the two-hour meters which is now in use on the shorter timed ones, except that two nickels may be used for two-hour parking privileges.

Last week's intake from the meters was the greatest since their installation on January 25, with a total of \$1100.12, about \$100 above the usual amount.

During May, 69 meters were reported out of order, but on investigation, 25 were found to be operating, and all of the others had the glass windows broken or had been plugged with a wide assortment of matches, paper, crooked coins, gravel, and in one case, varnish.

PORTLAND, June 12 (AP)—J. W. Maloney, collector of internal revenue here since 1933, said today he had resigned and would spend the rest of his years in Pendleton, Portland and the South.

Elizabeth Gives Speech

LONDON, June 12 (AP)—Princess Elizabeth, speaking as a future queen in her longest address, said Wednesday the link between the British Isles and the dominions "is stronger than it has ever been."

"Our commonwealth is not so much a single act of statecraft as a miracle of faith," she said.

She spoke to a large audience of dignitaries after receiving the freedom of the city of London.

Prime Minister Attlee and others listened intently to her clear, unhesitating voice. The king and queen did not accompany the heir presumptive.

As if noting assertions that Great Britain was a dying power, the 21-year-old princess declared:

"Suffering as we still do from the wounds of war, we naturally incline to be a little introspective and unsettled. But to hear the praises of our land and our people sounded so sincerely and so constantly as they are throughout the commonwealth, to realize that we are still looked up to and revered for our achievements, should indeed make us proud to possess and resolve to preserve the qualities which they admire."

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Navy Asks Adak Construction Okeh

WASHINGTON, June 12 (AP)—The navy asked a house armed services subcommittee yesterday to authorize

construction totaling \$3,548,000 at the naval operating base, Adak, Alaska, and \$14,675,000 at the Guam naval supply center.

Rear Admiral John J. Manning, chief of the navy bureau of yards and docks, said the policy of expanding the bases outside continental United States has the approval of the joint chiefs of staff.

The Adak projects include two storage buildings, \$2,560,000; a cold storage building, ice cream plant and milk facilities, \$340,000; ship repair facilities \$300,000, and a dispensary, \$340,000.
