Hungarian Government Criticized

BUDAPEST, Hungary, June 12 (AP)—A prominent member of parliament denounced the new communist-controlled government today and called on the smallholders party to adopt communist tactics if it ever hoped to set up a real democracy in Hungary.

Freedom Party Leader Deszo Suljok made a sarcastic, hour-long denunciation of the new regime, set up after the resignation of Premier Perenc Nagy. He said it had made Hungary a police state.

The wildest and most objectionable political terror reigns in Hungary, he said. "There is no freedom of press, assembly or opinion."

Earlier an American informant said the Russians had denied clearance to enter Hungary for Harold Snyder, an American representative of the United Nations educational, scientific and cultural organization.
