

Access Roads To Be Kept

WASHINGTON, June 12 (AP)—Some of the roads built by the forest service into its timber stands to meet emergency needs are planned for permanent use.

Chief Forester Waits wrote Senator Taylor (D-Ohio) that the larger part of access road funds now being spent is used for "main tap roads to large timber bodies."

"These forest areas," he said, "will be used over a great many years and, in some cases perpetually under the operating policy of sustained yield which governs the harvesting of national timber."

At the instance of Senator Gordon (R-Ore.), the senate recently provided an additional \$10,000,000 for access roads.

Waits explained that it is generally left to the timber purchaser to build the shorter branch roads to get out timber on individual sales of relatively short duration.

The government, he said, naturally gets better prices for its

timber if there is a way provided to get the timber to market.

He estimated "something over 1,000,000,000 feet" of timber will be hauled out this year over access roads constructed under the current program and that the treasury will receive nearly \$5,000,000 for this timber.

Army Rounds Up Last Of Deserters

HEIDELBERG, Germany, June 12 (AP)—The U. S. constabulary was believed tonight to have captured all but one of the eight American soldiers who escaped from Mannheim military prison Sunday and left a trail of robbery and violence.

The constabulary announced that the latest to be taken was Richard (Jerry) Kane, 34, of Rectortown, Va., who was seized on a Munich-bound train near Kassel. He bore three different sets of identification papers.
