

Australian Leaders Head Small Nations Attack In UN Over Soviet-US Delay

LAKE SUCCESS, June 13 (AP)—Col. W. R. Hodgson of Australia led a small nations attack today against a big power failure to break a 60-day deadlock between the United States and Russia on a basic working plan for world disarmament.

He told the United Nations commission on conventional armaments that the major powers had only delayed the group's work when they were given problems to settle among themselves.

While criticizing the Big Five's inability to agree on how to tackle arms limitation, Hodgson also drew attention to its failure to agree on a governor for the internationalized city of Trieste.

"We are back where we started from in this commission," the Australian said. "It is a surprising but a true thing that you have a great power submitting a proposal and another major power submitting a counter plan. You have had a power submitting a name for governor (of Trieste) and immediately you have another power submitting a counter name."

Expressing Australia's support of the U. S. plan for the regulation and reduction of armaments and armed forces, he urged the commission to get on with the job which the major powers had failed to accomplish.

In a 30-minute speech, Andrei A. Gromyko, Soviet delegate, upheld his plan for the commission's work as a simple and direct one and attacked the United States proposal as being of no value.

He also told the commission that it must recognize a link between prohibition of atomic weapons and general reduction of armaments. The United States plan, favored by the majority of the commission, does not recognize that link, the United States contending that this commission should not be concerned with atomic energy.

The commission adjourned until June 18 without acting on either plan.

Farmer Starts Jail Term Today
SEATTLE, June 13 (AP)—Unable to post \$5000 bail demanded by Superior Judge Hugh Todd in order to defer start of a three-month jail sentence until June 21, George Pfeiffer, 59, Dallas, Ore., farmer, was taken to jail late yesterday. Given the sentence and a \$400 fine for six traffic violations, he asked deferral of the sentence to return home to harvest his cherry crop. He moved to Oregon several months ago. He pleaded guilty to the charges yesterday.

State Police Force Upped

A legislature-approved appropriation to Oregon state police, which will enable the enlargement of staff here as well as at other patrol offices throughout the state, will go into effect July 1, but Sgt. Earl W. Tichenor of the Klamath Falls office said he did not know how many men would be allocated to his patrol.

The sergeant has made a recommendation to the head office asking that his present roster of nine men covering Klamath and Lake counties, be doubled, but no assurance has been received officially as to how large the local staff will be.

According to Sgt. Tichenor, his staff now includes Privates L. G. Bergmann, William J. Colbert, L. W. Harrold, Todd Knapp, Bob Milton, D. J. Reed and Mark Sullivan, all operating out of the Klamath Falls patrol, and Thomas Martin and Walter Schindler, stationed at Lakeview.

The Klamath-Lake patrol is one of the largest in the state of Oregon in point of square miles but not largest in consideration of population, the sergeant pointed out.

There is a tentative plan underway for a state police school to be conducted in mid-July at the Oregon Vocational school using the former Marine Barracks facilities, including the fine pistol range. The school is primarily for training and instruction of new recruits under the new appropriations increase.

Tichenor advised, and on completion of the school, recruits will undoubtedly be assigned to various patrol stations in the state.
