

# O. H. Allen Death Told

O. H. Allen, 77-year-old business man of Boise, Idaho, and the founder of the Klamath Furniture company of Klamath Falls, passed away last night at Boise, according to word received this morning by his grandson, Robert O. Sprout of Klamath Falls.

In 1927, Mr. Allen purchased the assets of the Klamath Home Supply company, and gave his new business establishment the name of Klamath Furniture company. He had been in the furniture business in Boise since 1903, and retained his residence and business interests in Boise after acquiring the furniture store here. He was in the furniture business at the time of his death, the firm being known as the Standard Furniture company there.

Robert Sprout, his son-in-law at that time, came here in 1929 to operate the Klamath Falls business, and Robert O. Sprout, son of Robert Sprout, entered the business a few years ago. Mr. Allen, until his death, retained an interest in the store, which was known to many of the business people of Klamath Falls.

The funeral service will be held Monday in Boise, and Robert Sprout and Robert O. Sprout will be in this week-end to be present at the service.

# Solons Deny Wallace Move

PORTLAND, June 13 (AP)—Leading Oregon democrats said today they had heard no plans for Henry Wallace to be a presidential candidate as reported by "an authoritative party source" at Los Angeles yesterday, and were divided in opinion on his strength.

T. C. Moore, executive secretary of the Oregon progressive citizens of America, said he had heard no serious talk of the candidacy but thought Wallace would make a "good showing" in Oregon.

George Levy, former Multnomah county democratic chairman, said, "I don't think he could win anything," but Jack Wahl, present county central committee chairman, said he thought Wallace "right now" would have a 50-50 chance.

# Ted Medford In Driving Contest

Ted M. Medford, formerly of Klamath Falls where he served as district manager of Safeway Stores and now living in Salem where he holds a similar position, was listed as a runner-up in a safe driving contest recently ended in the capital city.

# School Post Vote Monday

Voters who go to the polls in the school elections in both city and county on Monday, June 16, need not be taxpayers but legal residents of their respective districts for a period of 30 days, it was stressed today by the school superintendent's office.

Premont school in Klamath Falls will be the polling place for the election of a five-year director for Board No. 1, city elementary schools, and hours are from 2 to 7 p. m. Candidates are Mrs. Victor (Lucille) O'Neill, and Lee Hendricks.

In the county, two candidates are seeking the five-year directorship from the northern zone. They are Ora F. Blay, incumbent, and LeRoy Geinger, Chilquin. The vote is district-wide and at this time school committee members will also be named. Polls will be established in all county elementary school buildings.

# One-Time Premier Warns Of Red Move

LISBON, June 13 (AP)—Nicola Radescu, one-time premier of Romania, says that what happened in Hungary is an encirclement of what happened in Romania and an example of what Soviet Russia is trying to do to the world.

Radescu—who resigned the premiership February 28, 1945, in the face of Soviet criticism and has lived in Portugal since last April 2—declared in an interview that the Russians had framed both him and Ferenc Nagy, who quit the Hungarian premiership some two weeks ago under similar circumstances.

"The United Nations had better not ignore these facts," he added, "and take the matter in its hands before it becomes too late."
