

Five Meet Death In Northwest

Four persons met violent death in the Pacific Northwest yesterday, and a fifth was feared drowned.

Search was under way today for King County License Director Earl Navin, who failed to return from a Thursday salmon fishing trip on Puget sound. His beached boat was found yesterday near Eglon in Kitsap county.

Navin's son, Blair, located the boat and said "it looked as if it had floated in with the tide." He discounted any possibility his father might have wandered off into the desolate country nearby.

Navin had been in poor health, and in recent years had undergone a series of serious operations.

Two of the four accident victims were from Seattle. Ray Krause, 36, was electrocuted at the Isaacson Iron works when he came in contact with a 440-volt power line while adjusting a welding machine. H. A. Warfield, 22, Northern Pacific railroad switchman, was killed when two tank cars ran over him at the Stacy street yard. A fellow employee said Warfield apparently lost his footing and fell under the wheels.

Coy Hutton Jr., about 22, of Monmouth, Ore., was crushed to death while loading logs on a truck four miles east of Kings valley.

Larry Husted, 2, of Corvallis, was killed when he ran into the side of a passing logging truck as he chased an older brother into the streets. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Husted.

Mother Plans Reunion Soon

DENVER, June 14 (AP)—While sturdy, little eight-year-old George F. Alexander Jr. rode alone on the same train bearing his father's body from Seattle to Amoria, Okla., his divorced mother made plans for being reunited with her son.

The boy was left homeless in Seattle when his father, a baggage clerk, died suddenly of a heart ailment. Friends there gave him clothes, money and a letter explaining the situation and put him aboard the train for Amoria where he has relatives. He is expected to reach there Sunday.

But the youngster's grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. George Pritchett of Montrose, Colo., read of the boy's plight in a Denver newspaper, and said when the mother returns from a trip to the mountains the family will go to Amoria with the hope of bringing George back to live with them.

Two sisters, Virginia, 5, and Lavonne, 9, and a brother, Bobby, 7, live with the mother, who separated from George F. Alexander Sr. some time ago.

Plans Pushed For Erection Of Wiard Memorial Park

Plans for the Wiard Memorial park, between Wiard and Hope streets off South 6th, have been drawn by students of Klamath Union high school in a contest started before the close of school and it is probable that one will be selected upon which to base the contour plantings and arrangements of playground facilities, the proposed swimming pool and monuments at the entrances which will honor the pioneers of Klamath county.

Harry L. Wiard, responsible for the rapid expansion of plans that will make the five-acre plot one of the finest recreation spots in the county, announced this week that more than \$1200 has been donated by business establishments, clubs and individuals toward purchase of the ground. The acreage was sold by the county for \$3500 with the understanding that it is to be used for a park.

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Forests Are Topic Of Lowden Talk

The regular Friday noon assembly of Klamath Falls Rotarians was addressed by Merle Lowden, supervisor of the Fremont national forest, on the topic, "National Forest Timber."

Lowden described in detail the functions of national forest administration, particularly as they pertain to the Klamath country and its economic welfare, and specifically with regard to the future available timber resources of the area.

"The shock of reduction of over 50 per cent in Klamath's logging industry has already been assimilated," Lowden said, "and the impact hasn't been nearly as fearful as many businessmen feared, principally due to the continuing increase in associated manufacturing industries and operations."

An estimated 3,000,000 board-foot annual timber cut should be realized from now on as a sustained yield basis which, remanufacturing considered, should hold forest industries among the basin's top payroll producers," he concluded.

Murder Trial Recessed After Hearing Defendant

PORTLAND, June 14 (AP)—The first degree murder trial of Patrick Raymond, 40—who also admitted to three other sets of names—was in recess today, following his first appearance on the stand in his own defense.

Raymond, night club operator in the waterfront district, who is accused of beating to death Ship Capt. Frank B. Tatum, 83, Billerica, Mass., last January, is to continue his testimony in circuit court Monday.

Raymond denied on the stand yesterday that he had killed Tatum, testifying that the captain was alive and making "good old healthy snore" when carried from Raymond's night club after the fight.

He also contradicted testimony of two men who said they witnessed the brawl, testifying "I definitely did not jump on anyone, particularly someone I like as I did the captain."

In fact, he went on, they were quite friendly, and the fight started only over a drinking bet—whether Tatum could down ten jiggers of whisky as Raymond had. The night club operator testified Tatum drank only five then started the fight when he was "mildly cursed" by Raymond.

The two who testified earlier were John Snyder, 20, and Harold Schorn, 25, who said that on Raymond's orders they carried out Tatum's body and dumped it over an embankment in a residential district. Snyder said he believed Tatum dead at the time. Tatum's body was found a week later.

Each had been indicted on first degree murder charges, but pleaded guilty to manslaughter before testifying.

Raymond, who said he was born Hubert Cyrus Patterson 37 years ago, told the court he was brought up in the Walla Walla-Pendleton region. He said he considered his original name a sort of "sissy" name and changed it to Patrick Gene O'Day when he began boxing professionally later.

At other times he had given police his name as Pat Lee and Patrick Raymond, he said, although he denied that on one occasion he had told police he was "Patrick Cohen Raymond."

Cause of the woman's death was not determined. Stenger died May 27, and an autopsy disclosed drugs "in sufficient quantity to possibly cause death."

Columbia Basin Fund Up Asked

WASHINGTON, June 14 (AP)—Senator Magnuson (D-Wash.) plans to ask the senate to increase Columbia basin funds recommended by the appropriations committee.

He said today he will ask for the budget amount of \$27,000,000 rather than this committee figure of \$20,354,000.

Magnuson said he is satisfied with the increase from the \$6,907,000 house figure to \$16,222,400 for Bonneville power administration. (Senator Cain (R-Wash.) said in a statement that he and representatives Holmes, Horan, Tolleson and Jones, republicans, were agreed that the increased appropriations "evidence to us that a good compromise has been worked out for the best interests of the Pacific Northwest while protecting the nation's ability to finance such projects."

"I feel that the interests of Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana have been amply taken care of," Cain said. "I believe Washington State has been very fortunate in increased appropriations greater than those made by congress last year. The Columbia basin appropriation is some \$2,000,000 more than was given the project last year."

Horan said he and the other Washington house members together with the Oregon members would work in the house to keep the senate increases in the bill.

LONG BEACH, Calif., June 14 (AP)—John Ben Sheppard, 30, Gladeswater, Tex., attorney, is the new president of the United States junior chamber of commerce.

He was elected without opposition yesterday. Potentates elected included: Bob Graham, Seattle, Wash., regional vice president.

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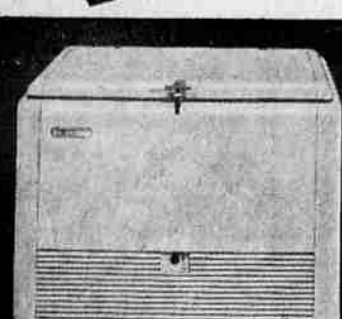
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
