SPOKANE, June 14 (AP)—Aging Tiger Jack Fox of Spokane, who had vowed he would "eat" Heavyweight Champion Joe Louis, had a sore nose today as a result of his four-round exhibition boxing bout here last night.

Louis gave Fox a nose bleed in the first round after the veteran fighter had used his trick of rolling with the ropes to land some solid punches. The two sparred in the second and third rounds and wound up the match with some slugging in the fourth. The champion weighed in at 212, Fox at 192.

Winter Deer Range Forage Under Study



The age-old problem of winter feeding for the deer herd which lives in Oregon in the summer-time but moves down into the Modoc national forest when the weather begins to get cold is coming in for some scientific study now.

This particular clump of bitterbrush was fenced off by the forest service two years ago to see just how much it would grow if protected from feeding by the deer herd.

It can be compared with two very small clumps in the foreground of the picture which were not protected and in consequence were pretty thoroughly nibbled over during the past two winters. Bitterbrush, juniper and other flora of the forest is the natural feed for the wintering deer, but cattle and sheep also graze in the Modoc and the problem of the foresters, ranchers and sportsmen is to determine just which group of animals is doing the most damage to the forage.

The problem is far from settled, although being studied on all sides. At times the deer vs. livestock controversy gets hot.

Mort Cooper To New York

NEW YORK, June 14 (AP)—Morton Cooper, mainstay of three St. Louis Cardinals pennant winning teams, Mel Patton of the University of Southern California's front-running New York Giants.

The big right-hander, who starred with the Redbird champions of 1942-43-44 and was the circuit's most valuable player in 1942, was obtained by the Giants yesterday from the Boston Braves in a deal that sent Pitcher Bill Voiselle and cash to Boston.

Currently leading the circuit by a half game, the surprising Giants have been looking for a route-going right-hander all season as Rookie Bill Ayers and Voiselle have failed to come through while Larry Jansen has been erratic. The brunt of the right-handed mount chores so far has been borne by Clint Hartung, reconverted outfielder, and relief specialist Ken Trinkle.

Cooper has been plagued by arm trouble since 1945 and hasn't been of much use to the Braves this season. He has a record of two wins as against five defeats.

Although the veteran hurler had the same trouble last year and didn't look like the Cooper of old until late in the campaign, the Giants are gambling that he regains his old effectiveness.
