Board Meeting

A telegram to President Truman was approved at a board meeting of the League of Women Voters Tuesday requesting a veto of the wool bill if it passes with a tariff provision. In spite of the fact that imported wool, even after paying a tariff of 34 cents a pound can undersell American wool, the league believes that a subsidy of American wool as first proposed in the wool bill would be less costly to American economy than if the country starts to erect a series of obstacles to world trade.

The petition on the cigarette tax in relation to state educational funds was also discussed. It was decided that study groups in foreign policy be continued with both afternoon and evening meetings, and it was announced that Mrs. William Brisen will conduct the evening study group. A discussion group on basic tax structure, particularly relating to the sales tax, is to be organized and time and place will be announced shortly. In line with the league's policy of hearing both sides of any question, material will be presented "pro and con." Any interested woman, whether or not a member of the league, is urged to join these groups in order to vote intelligently at the coming fall election.
