

Oaks Take Over Lead On Coast

Hugh Mulcahy, the former Philadelphia Phillies ace, pitched the Oakland Oaks into the Pacific league lead yesterday with a sparkling two-hit, 4-1 nightcap win over Seattle.

It was Mulcahy's finest job since joining Oakland a month ago. His gates got nine hits in the second game after losing the first one, 10-9, in 11 innings. The Oaks took the series, 5 games to 2.

The split decision enabled Oakland to take a one-game lead in the light race because the contenders, San Francisco and Los Angeles, each lost doubleheaders. Meantime Portland beat Sacramento, 8-4, in their first game and lost the nightcap, 3-2.

San Diego took the first game from San Francisco, 7-5, although they were out to 26 to 10. In the seven-inning second game the Padres walloped the Seals, 10-4, collecting 13 hits to San Francisco's 9. The twin win gave San Diego a 5-2 game series edge.

Hollywood took 5-4 and 5-3 pokes at their cross-city rivals, Los Angeles, before a record crowd of 12,644 at Gilmore field which boosted the seven-game series attendance to 62,942, another record.

Sacramento by taking their series from Portland, 5 games to 2, climbed into fourth place behind Oakland, San Francisco and Los Angeles, with Portland resting on the fifth rung, followed by San Diego, Hollywood and Seattle.

Pro Basketball Issues Charter

SEATTLE, June 16 (AP)—The Pacific Coast Pro Basketball league has spread its wings, granting franchises to six California cities and hinting that Honolulu may be in the fold before the next season starts.

Setting up the new circuit at a Saturday meeting here, league officials decided to split the loop into northern and southern divisions, with a coast championship playoff in the spring. The winner will battle with champions of the National Pro Basketball league and Basketball Association of America in a "world series."

Northern members lined up for next season are Portland, Yakima, Bellinham, Seattle, Vancouver, B. C., and Astoria, Ore. With Tacoma planning to request a franchise. In the south will be Oakland, San Jose, San Francisco, Pasadena, Hollywood and Long Beach. Schedules will be drawn up July 12 at another meeting here.

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Bosox Win On Couple Of Homers

His name is Murrell Jones but up in Boston the fans believe it should be "Merriwell" Jones.

For the big guy, who was acquired from the Chicago White Sox only last Saturday night in an even swap for Rudy York, got going for his new club like the fictional hero.

Playing his first game in a Red Sox uniform, the 26-year-old first baseman from Evans, La., smashed out a home run to help defeat his former mates 7-3. He did even better in the second game, belting a home run with the bases full with two out in the last half of the ninth inning to win for Boston 8-7. Earlier in the game, Jones had singled in two runs to give him a total of six RBIs for the game.

In the meantime the best York could do in his first day in a White Sox uniform was to get two singles in eight times at bat, both of his hits coming in the second game and having nothing to do with Chicago's scoring. The Red Sox moved into a second place tie with the Detroit Tigers, ralling the Yankees by one game.

The Yankees had climbed into the American League's number one position by virtue of a double win over the St. Louis Browns. After combing Jack Kramer for a 10-4 victory in the opener of the double header, the Yanks, behind Rany Gumpert, eked out a 2-1 win against Bob Muncie.

Washington surprised the Tigers by taking both ends of a double-header, 1-0 and 5-1, to knock the Bengals out of the league lead.

The battering Boston Braves blasted eight Pittsburgh pitchers to retain first place in the National league. They lead the second place New York Giants by six percentage points.

The Giants retained a slim two point margin over the third place Cubs by winning the second game of their double header with the Reds in Cincinnati 9-1 after dropping the opener 4-2.

School Boy Rowe snapped a five-game winning streak of the Chicago Cubs in pitching a 6-1 victory for the Philadelphia Phillies. Rowe did not walk a man, making it fifth time this season that the veteran right-hander has not issued a pass.

The fast climbing St. Louis Cardinals moved within a half game of the fifth place Reds by taking their fourth straight from the Brooklyn Dodgers in St. Louis 11-3. After losing the opener to Cleveland 5-2, the Philadelphia Athletics got an even break when they came from behind with three runs in the eighth to win the nightcap, 6-4.

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Missed Putt For Snead Hands Open To Worsham

ST. LOUIS, June 16 (AP)—The corner golf folks have been talking for several years—Lewis W. (Lew) Worsham of Washington, D. C.—thunderously has arrived, with the National Open crown perched jauntily on a fast-thinking head.

Some say it was Sam Snead's schoolboyish putting on the 18th green of their title playoff at the St. Louis country club yesterday that gave 29-year-old Worsham a dramatic one-stroke victory and a ticket into goldfom's big money bracket.

Lew, a newly appointed professional at Oakmont, Pa., collected \$2,500 for his triumph and figures to grab some \$20,000 more in testimonials and attempt rewards offered by an Open titlist.

But when Sammy from Hot Springs, Va., blew a 30½-inch putt for his losing 70, it was seconds after Worsham pulled a psychological switch—demanding that U.S.G.A. officials measure both balls to see who had the outside lie in the playoff taps for both.

Snead had judged he was a fraction outside of where Worsham's ball had squirted after nicking the

cup in a magnificent chip shot from the rim of the green and stepped up to address the ball.

Worsham coolly interrupted him and waved in the officials, armed with a tape measure, who took several minutes to confirm what Snead had guessed—he was a half inch outside Worsham's ball on the opposite side of the cup and had first play.

But the interruption obviously nettled already-harrassed Snead, who was anxious to follow up his falling first putt from 15 feet, a stragly short tap that left him the fatal 10½ inches shy. Like Worsham, he was anxious to get his putt in first and put the pressure on the last player.

Snead was less steady than before as he approached the ball the second time. Worsham's justifiable call for a measurement had its damaging effect—some veteran observers said it was one of the wisest stratagems ever pulled in open competition.

Sam's putt squirted off to the right and missed the cup completely.

Duck Pitcher Goes To Solons
