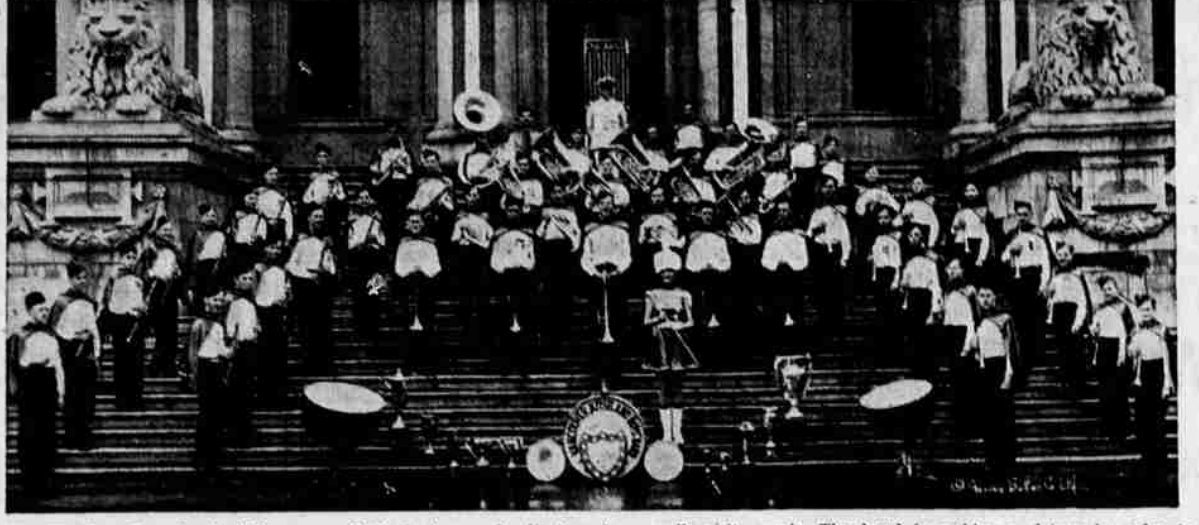

# Four Fatal Air Crashes Claim 54 Lives In U. S.

Four fatal airplane-crashes occurred over the week-end, one an airliner disaster that took a toll of 50 dead and raised the number killed in commercial plane crashes since May 29 to 146—49 more than died in domestic airline accidents all last year.

Continuation of the air accidents prompted President Truman yesterday to appoint a five-man board to inquire into all phases of air safety.

Last Friday, the 13th, a Capital Airlines plane carrying 47 passengers and a crew of three crashed into a granite mountainside near Keys Gap, W. Va., killing all aboard. Just two weeks before a United Airlines plane crashed while attempting to take off at La Guardia field, in New York City, killing 43.

# 10,000 Auto Workers Idle

DETROIT, June 17 (AP)—Three separate labor disputes idled more than 10,000 automobile workers today as a strike vote proceeded among 130,000 Ford Motor Co. employees.

The latest dispute involved the disciplinary layoff of an employee accused by officials of the Chrysler Corp. with carelessness in the handling of materials at the De Soto-Wyoming plant.

Fellow members of the G.O. United Automobile Workers at the plant, 2860 strong, left their jobs yesterday in protest.

A materials shortage, partially attributed by the company to the De Soto tie-up, forced about 3000 other workers from their jobs at the corporation's Jefferson and Kercheval plants.

A disciplinary dispute kept 1200 other UAW-CIO workers idle at the Continental Motor Corp.

Meanwhile, UAW-CIO Production Workers at the Ford River Rouge plant began balloting on the question of backing up with strike action the union's current contract negotiations.

GOLD BEACH, June 17 (AP)—Searchers today had virtually given up the hunt for Darlene Hogan, 16, who vanished five days ago when she left her home near Brookings to drive a herd of goats to pasture.

In the course of the hunt four men became lost at various times but reached safety.

# French Official Asks Machinery

PORTLAND, June 17 (AP)—France urgently needs industrial machinery to rebuild her economy, Raoul Bertrand, French consul general for the 11 western states, said today on a trip from his San Francisco post.

Bertrand is here visiting Northwest businessmen, with one of his main interests the purchase of portable sawmills for use in the mahogany forests of French West Africa.

He also hopes to spur exchange of students between the two countries.

# Carloading Figure Drops

SEATTLE, June 17 (AP)—Pacific Northwest carloadings in May totaled 96,464 cars, lowest May figure in records running back six years, but the year's total to date of 511,033 cars was well above the past two years mark, the Pacific Northwest advisory board reported today. Logs accounted for 29,914 cars in May and forest products 28,740.

# Standard Audience Count System Asked

PORTLAND, Ore., June 17 (AP)—The Oregon and Washington Broadcasters' associations were asked today to work for a standard system of counting radio audiences.

C. J. Arney, treasurer of the National Association of Broadcasters, said the methods used by rating organizations to measure the listening audience "are so general they can hardly be accepted as standard."

About 125 radio executives attended the conference. Nearly every radio station in the two states was represented.

# Flyer Arrested For Buzzing

PENDLETON, Ore., June 17 (AP)—Deno Vichas of Rieth today was charged with illegal flying after state police reported he buzzed a train and several buildings in the Birch creek area before crashing his rented plane alongside the railroad tracks one mile south of here Sunday.

Vichas, the complaint, charged, flew his plane so close to the train that it nearly landed on top of the cars. He was injured slightly in the crash. Train crewmen helped him from the wreckage of the small plane he had rented from Pendleton Airways.

# Auto Strike Settlements

DETROIT, June 17 (AP)—The number of strike-idle auto workers dwindled to near the 5,000 mark here Monday as final settlement of wage disputes with the Packard Motor Car Co. and Briggs Manufacturing Co. was announced by the CIO United Auto Workers.

Tentative agreement with the Bendix Aviation Co. on the industry's wage pattern of an 11 1/2 hourly increase and six paid holidays also was disclosed by the UAW-CIO.

Meanwhile, the strike of 3,800 members of the independent Foreman's Association of America went into its 27th day at the Ford Motor Co. and 1,200 employees of the Continental Motor Car Co. remained out in a disciplinary dispute.

The Packard agreement, reached last Thursday, was ratified Sunday. It provides for a flat 15-cent hourly wage boost for some 9,000 workers and dismissal of all union postal pay suits.

The Briggs settlement, which came last week on the eve of a strike deadline, also was ratified Sunday. It covers some 20,000 employees in six Briggs plants in Detroit and one in Evansville, Ind., and follows the 11 1/2 cent pattern with six paid holidays.
