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Klamath County Tax Value Shows Big Gain For 47-48

Klamath county's assessed valuation, exclusive of utilities, is \$26,237,760 for 1947-48, it was announced today by Newton B. Nelson, county assessor.

Last year's figure was \$20,787,485, but the increase was largely due to an across-the-board boost of 25 per cent in valuations ordered for this county on request of the county court and city council.

The utilities valuations are determined by the state tax commission, and until this is done, the actual assessed valuations on which the coming year's tax levies will be based cannot be announced. Last year's utilities valuations totaled \$10,914,998.

Newton said he could not say whether the tax commission will boost utilities valuations on the 25 per cent basis as was done with other property.

The increased valuations, he pointed out, will unquestionably contribute to a reduced tax rate. It will not be possible to figure tax rates, however, until the utilities are reported.

The total of real property valuation in the county for next year is \$19,491,050. This includes: land, \$7,261,080; structures on unplatted land, \$1,964,520; platted land, \$3,424,610; structures on platted land, \$6,840,840.

The personal property total is \$6,781,360. The breakdown: improvements on lands of U. S., \$11,200; machinery, equipment, boats, aircraft, rolling stock, \$2,416,520; merchandise (stock in trade), \$2,484,230; farm implements, \$626,920; furniture and equipment, \$427,650; horses and mules, \$1298; \$38,760; cattle, \$23,598; \$599,610; sheep and goats, \$16,922; \$82,230; swine, \$124,516; \$66,030; poultry, \$28,179; \$7060; fur-
