

Portland Making Bid For Ryder Golf Match

Wealthy Bob Hudson, Oregon's No. 1 Links Enthusiast, Says He Will Better Any Financial Offer For The Games

SAN FRANCISCO, June 17 (AP)—Resumption of the Ryder cup golf competition between British and American professionals this year brings Mr. Robert Hudson Sr., of Portland, Ore., into the picture with a big bang.

In case the casual sports page readers are not acquainted with the name, it may be explained that Bob Hudson is probably the No. 1 golf enthusiast of Oregon, if not the entire Pacific coast. Aside from that, he is a highly successful and wealthy businessman whose chief delight is backing important golf tournaments.

From a modest start, if putting up a check for \$10,000 to personally back the initial Portland Open a few years ago may be described as modest, Hudson worked up to the national PGA championship last August. His outlay for the event was something like \$30,000 and the venture came through with flying colors.

Now that the Ryder cup matches are coming back after a war time lapse, Sportsman Hudson is definitely in the market for this interesting international series. The American PGA people will be the hosts for the 1947 renewal and when they pick their team June 23 at Detroit, there is no doubt they will carefully weigh the bid from the man who wants to sponsor the event in Portland.

Hudson informs me that he will meet and most likely better any bid for the Ryder cuppers. If successful in his quest, he plans to fly the British team members from and back to Britain. The Americans also will be brought to Portland on a full expense deal.

Literally interpreted, Hudson's "full expense" program means top visiting golfers won't have to spend a quarter of their own money, unless they should decide to drop a coin in a slot machine.

For his size, Portland "probably is the hottest golf city in the country. They turn out in terrific numbers. Golf pros are idolized and get writer's cramp signing autographs. When Sam Snead played in his first Portland Open, just getting out of the navy, and learned that practically everything was on the house, he wanted to know "how long has this been going on?"

Freddie Sommers, booking agent for Joe Louis, current exhibition boxing tour, said today he had received a long distance telephone call from Anchorage, Alaska, offering \$10,000 and a cut of the gate for an exhibition appearance there in July.

Included in the offer, made by Ernie Stolen of the Alaska city, were plane tickets from Chicago to Anchorage. Sommers said Joe would give the offer every consideration.

Irwin Whitt, star athlete who was graduated from Klamath Union high school last week, is taking the next step up the ladder on his baseball career today.
