

# "Draft Wallace" Move Shapes Up After Appeal For Truman-Stalin Confab

WASHINGTON, June 17 (AP)—A "draft Henry Wallace for president" movement began to take shape today as the former vice president awaited an official response to his call for a Truman-Stalin meeting in Berlin to settle Soviet-American differences.

Wallace, the most vocal critic of President Truman's foreign policy in this country, said he knew nothing of the "draft" move, which originated in California.

But in his first public appearance last night before a cheering outdoor crowd estimated at from 8,000 to 10,500, "there will be a new party if the two major parties continue to pursue the present suicidal course toward war and depression."

**"First Step"**

He called on Mr. Truman to invite Premier Stalin to meet with him in Berlin to discuss economic and trade relations between the two countries as a "first step" to world peace.

Robert W. Kenny, former California attorney general, said in Los Angeles that the draft-Wallace campaign would get under way at a meeting in Fresno, Calif., July 19. Wallace will not appear, but will send a message to the gathering, Kenny said.

The primary purpose, he added, will be to set up a committee to prepare a slate of 54 candidates for a pre-Wallace California delegation to the next democratic national convention.

Kenny, southern California chairman of the Progressive Citizens of America, which sponsored many of Wallace's recent speeches across the country, said:

**First in Series**

"This may be the first in a series of grass-roots get-togethers throughout the country."

Wallace spoke last night at the Watergate, a government-owned amphitheater near the Lincoln memorial. The audience occupied 8,500 reserved seats which sold for 60 cents to \$3.50 and spread out on nearby memorial bridge and a bordering roadway.

Officials of the Southern Conference for Human Welfare, which sponsored the rally, said \$8000 was collected from the audience in donations ranging from \$1 to \$500.

# Bruce Named Ambassador

WASHINGTON, June 17 (AP)—President Truman today nominated James Bruce, Maryland corporation executive, to be ambassador to Argentina, succeeding George Messersmith, who recently resigned.

Bruce is a graduate of Princeton University and the University of Maryland. He served in the National Dairy Products corporation and a director of 14 corporations.

Mr. Truman's action completes a series of moves marking this country's swing to more cordial relations with the Argentines.

Messersmith and Spruille Braden, assistant secretary of state for Latin American affairs, and an exponent of a "firm" Argentine policy, resigned after Mr. Truman's recent announcement that he is satisfied with the South American Republic's purge of fascist influences.

Mr. Braden was succeeded as assistant secretary by Norman Armour, long time career diplomat with a background of service in Latin America.
