11th, Washington Site May Be Cleared Of Buildings

The removal of buildings on the corner of 11th and Washington was discussed Tuesday when representatives of Klamath Falls, the bureau of reclamation, and the Rogue river forest service met at the chamber of commerce. These buildings had previously been occupied by the bureau of reclamation before its offices were moved to the Klamath Falls municipal airport, and the bureau is now interested in disposing of the buildings and property.

Most interested in obtaining the half acre triangle of land bordering 11th street is the Klamath county school district which was represented at the meeting by Nelson Reed of the school board and A. L. Grainger, superintendent of city schools. This land would be used for school parking and would afford a new approach to Klamath Union high school. Both Reed and Grainger stressed the need of a new high school approach as the present approach on Wall will be too dangerous if Highway No. 97 is routed down Esplanade. If this area were taken over by the school a new bridge across the canal could be built to join 11th street with either Monclair or Alameda and thus remove any possibilities of a bottleneck at the Washington street bridge which might be caused by the additional traffic to the high school.

The Rogue river forest service is also interested in the buildings and land for storage and office purposes. It was agreed by those present that the buildings in their present condition are an eye-sore and cause a traffic hazard when trucks enter 11th from the property. For these reasons Charles Stark, chamber of commerce, E. M. Irl, city planning commission, and Sam Ritchey, traffic safety council, decided that another location for forest buildings would be better if it could be found.

According to present plans this property will be appraised and, if no direct agreement with the school board can be made, will be sold to the highest bidder.
