

Venturists Attend Club's Luncheon

Thursday was Venture club day at the Soroptimist club meeting. Representatives of the Venture club attending the luncheon were the retiring president, Frances Hall; incoming president, Mary Bishop; Norma Steubin and Marjory Onigman. Reports of their accomplishments for the year were given by various Venturists to their sponsoring club, the Soroptimists. The first speaker, Norma Steubin, told of their trip by airplane and boat to Vancouver, B. C., where they stayed in the palatial Empress hotel, and attended the conference of Northwest Venture clubs held at the hotel.

Frances Hall gave a brief resume of the work accomplished by the local club during the past year. Mrs. Johnson has represented the club at all meetings since her appointment by the president, Gertrude Moore, and has brought back interesting reports.

It was a big moment in the life of the club when Katherine Newman, recipient of the Soroptimist award of a \$400 scholarship in a nurse's training school of her own choosing, was introduced to the members.

The club has adopted as its permanent project, the financial encouragement of ambitious young women, and Katherine is the first choice for this award.

An attractive 14-page bulletin entitled "Along the Oregon Trail With Soroptimists" and carrying a cover design the Centennial Seal used during the 1946 pageant, was presented to the members. Regional Director Claire Nicholls had selected a club from each state in the Northwest region to compile a history of the work done by all the clubs in the state and the honor of preparing the Oregon bulletin was given to the Klamath Falls club. Many of the club reports were headed by some outstanding feature of the locality and Klamath Falls chose its Klamath Netted Gem. Lakeview used the Albert Rim, Salem, the beautiful capitol building, and Coquille, the myrtle tree.
