VANCOUVER, B. C., June 19 (AP)—Decision on compulsory, all-day Wednesday closing of retail stores here received a decisive "yes" vote from voters last night. Plebiscite returns showed 20,317 in favor with 12,051 opposed. Although voters signified their approval, all-day Wednesday closing will still require action on the part of city council to become legal. The plebiscite was merely a poll of citizens' opinion.
