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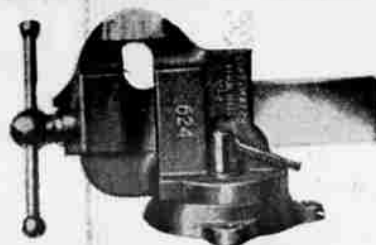
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Brass Ensemble To Appear Here

Senate Approves USES Shift

WASHINGTON, June 20 (AP)—Over objections by Chairman Taft (R-Ohio), the senate labor committee Thursday recommended the senate approval of President Truman's plan for shifting the United

States employment service permanently to the labor department. Taft told reporters the vote was 6 to 5.

A senate labor subcommittee yesterday approved the transfer program, known as reorganization plan No. 2, by a vote of 3 to 2. The program will go into effect automatically July 1 unless the senate disapproves. The house has rejected the plan.

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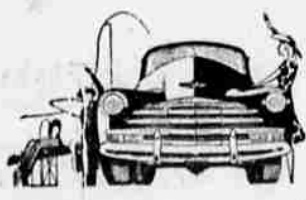
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
