The figures will all be changed anyway before the problem comes up again.

The results will be mostly political.

INVESTIGATION of ownership and control of the British press by England's socialist regime is giving rise to uneasy speculation abroad as to whether this indicates the development of a further leftist tendency by the government.
The launching of the present high-powered survey was preceded by much pressure from communists and fellow travelers who maintained—to quote the view of the London communist Daily Worker—that "the press today is a menace to democratic methods of government." The paper advocated "adequate reforms" which, though not specified, obviously would mean following the communistic method of placing the press under strict government regimentation.

Major Experiment
HOWEVER, Mr. Atlee is performing a major experiment in socialism. He feels that he can make it work, but there certainly is the danger that it may blow up in his face unless he handles it with extreme caution. His task is to demonstrate that there can be socialism, with a degree of nationalism but without wholesale regimentation of the individual.
A free press has been one of the mighty pillars of British democracy. And the press has indeed been free. Even in wartime the censorship has been voluntary. The only legal controls have been vested in laws such as those dealing with libel and an act which forbids newspapers during criminal trials to refer to any previous convictions of the accused.

Little Influence

Muskrat Take Big This Year

POPLAND, June 29 (AP)—More than 77,000 muskrats were trapped in Oregon in the 1946-47 season by 2483 licensed trappers, the state game commission reported today. The entire fur take brought \$208,875 in revenue to the commission, said with the muskrat total of \$101,006 well in front. However, only \$349 mink yielded \$71,569. The two other leading species taken were raccoon, 37,000, yielding \$10,000 in revenue and 1138 returning \$19,437. Counties yielding the highest returns: Harney \$23,183; Klamath \$16,849; Lane \$14,296; Clatsop \$13,809; Malheur \$13,149; Douglas \$11,306; Baker \$10,908; Jackson \$9,749.

The figures do not include many of the predators taken by hunters last year around, but only those classified as fur-bearers, the report said.

Ty Cobb Asks For Divorce

RENO, June 29 (AP)—Ty Cobb, one of the greatest baseball players of all time, Thursday filed suit for divorce from Charis Lombard Cobb after 39 years of marriage. The wealthy "Georgia Peach" of diamond fame, who lives at Atherton, Calif., near San Francisco, sued on grounds he and his wife had been separated at least three years.

The complaint said a property settlement had been reached. Mrs. Cobb signed a waiver subjecting the case to jurisdiction of the Nevada court. She sued for divorce in March at Redwood City, Calif., asking \$5000 monthly alimony and division of community property valued at \$7,000,000, but the action was set for withdrawal.

Masons To Celebrate 67th Anniversary Of Local

The 67th anniversary of the Klamath Falls Masonic lodge 77, will be celebrated Saturday night in the Masonic temple with an informal dance and entertainment, for all Master Masons and their wives. McDonald and Morrison's seven-piece orchestra will supply the rhythm for dancing and refreshments will be served by Dale Beber and Jack Metter.

Chairman of the dance committee is Bill Milne who will be assisted by Richard Griffith. Clyde Thompson will attend to the welcoming of guests and a short history of the lodge will be presented by Lee Hendricks. This lodge was instituted in 1879 and constituted on June 15, 1880 with Alex P. McCarton as worshipful master.

Little is known of the first years existence for in 1889 all books and records were destroyed by fire. The only article saved was the officers sword, which had been used by the marshal of parade (Labor Day it is understood) some time before and had not been returned to the hall. During the years Lodge 77 has enjoyed a steady growth and now numbers over 500 members. For many years meetings were held in the Loomis building and in 1934 the Moose hall on Klamath between 4th and 5th streets was purchased.

The activities of the lodge have been many and can not be given in detail. Some of the outstanding lodge activities of later years have been the participation in the officers held on Prisoner's rock in the Lava Beds. In 1938 many members journeyed to Sacramento, Calif., to confer the Master Mason degree upon one of its own candidates. In 1935 a Southern Oregon meeting was held here with about 300 in attendance. In 1941 Provident Lodge No. 801 of Sacramento, Calif., came to Klamath Falls and conferred the California work upon its own candidate. This meeting was held in the high school gym and was attended by more than 400 members. Twenty-four jurisdictions were represented from a total of 118 lodges.

PRIEST BEATEN AT HANDS OF MOB
TRISTE, June 29 (AP)—Magr. Antonio Santini, 51-year-old Roman Catholic bishop of Capodistria and Trieste, was confined to bed today as the result of a severe mauling he received at the hands of a mob who attacked him yesterday in Capodistria as he was about to lead a Saints Day procession through the Yugoslav-occupied community.

Allied military government authorities were reported to have recommended to their governments that diplomatic representations be made to Yugoslavia over the incident.
