

# Seals Blast Way Back To First Place

Eight big runs in the fifth inning last night boomed the San Francisco Seals back into the Pacific Coast league lead.

The barrage gave the Seals their third straight over the Sacramento Solons, 9-5, and a margin of one percentage point over Los Angeles Angels, who also moved up as Oakland dropped down on the PCL leader-trotter.

Seal Twister Bob Joyce contributed two singles to the large frame, unopposed entirely at the expense of Jarth (Red) Mann. Before the assault subsided, Mann had suffered the indignity of eight ringing hits including Neil Sheridan's 10th homer and Joe Brovia's 410-foot triple.

While the Seals were thus thriving, the Angels edged San Diego for the third consecutive game, 1-0; Portland tripped the Oaks, 3-2; and tail-end Seattle came to life to halt Hollywood, 5-0.

Angel Second Baseman Lou Siringo slotted one over the left field fence for the only score against Southpaw Tom Seals, the Padres' hard luck champion. Seals now has lost eight games—six of them by one run. Russ Bauser, going the route for the first time, was the winner, scattering eight hits while Seals gave up seven.

Four Oakland errors contributed to Charley Gassaway's downfall as the Acorns out of the lead a fortnight ago, did it all over again. Two of the Beaver tallies were unearned, but big Jack Salveson held the Oaks to six hits—and scoreless until the ninth inning when Gene Lillard homered with a man on.

The Heavers took the series lead, two games to one.  
Walt Dubiel's slick four-hit job gave Seattle its first series win over the Stars. Dubiel walked none, fanned three and got solid support—including three doubles plays and a pair of fancy catches by Center-fielder Johnny Rucker.

Mickey Rocco drove in three runs and scored a fourth in an early assault on Hugh Orphan. A fifth run came off Al Yastilan.

The opener was a draw, one fall each, and a good match. Buck Weaver hit Davidson with a flying tackle and clamped his head in a chiropractic lock in the third round. Davidson made it even in the fifth with a press after each had been out of the ring once.

Baseball's dizzy pennant races are reverting to form as the clubs approach the one-third mark with another Boston Red Sox-St. Louis Cardinals world series a distinct possibility.

Now the Red Sox are in first place with an unbroken eight-game winning streak and the Cards have surged from last to fifth, only four games out of first, by winning their last seven straight.

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# Jim Demaret Fires Lowest Qualify Card

DETROIT, June 20 (AP)—Tony Penna, veteran Cincinnati golfer, knocked defending Champion Ben Hogan of Hershey, Pa. out of the Professional Golfers association championship in the first match-play round today, by a 3 and 1 margin.

DETROIT, June 20 (AP)—Defending Champion Ben Hogan, hard-tutting, methodical little man, and Medalist Jimmy Demaret, top tournament money winner of the year, led 64 qualifiers into match play of the national PGA championship today.

The two stars from Hershey, Pa., and Ojai, Calif., and the other survivors of two days of heated qualifying rounds started whacking away at each other in man-to-man struggles in the opening 18-hole round of match play.

Hogan, only automatic qualifier in the field, squared off in his first match against Tony Penna, a pit-sized Cincinnati who qualified with 72-74-146. This was two strokes over par for the 36 holes and just three strokes under the qualifying maximum of 149, with which Jack Smith, call, slogger from Marshall, Tex., pro, squeezed into the bracket in an 11-way playoff.

Demaret, who was pro here for two years and knows Plum Hollow Golf club's long, rolling 922-yard tournament test as well or better than anyone else in the field, put together two fine sub-par rounds of 68-69-137, to win \$250, the Alex Smith memorial trophy, and a narrow one-stroke qualifying edge over Clayton Haefer, tall blond from Charlotte, N. C., and Claude Harmon, one-time dance band vocalist show pro at Winged Foot Country club, Mamaroneck, N. Y.

Harmon drew home pro Sam Byrd, Harmon was a semi-finalist in the 1945 PGA at Dayton, O., where Byrd reached the finals before losing to Byron Nelson.

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# Regatta Looks Close

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., June 20 (AP)—A close five-way finish staged up today in the 44th Poughkeepsie regatta with California, Washington, Navy, Cornell and Princeton apparently strongest in a field of 11.

Tomorrow's crew race down the Hudson — revived after a six-year war suspension — will have favorable weather by present indications although a breeze is threatening that could prove treacherous on the wide river.

If a west wind develops the advantage will be with undefeated California in No. 2 lane close to the Palisades on the west bank.

The Intercollegiate Rowing association last night decided to make no change in the location of the races although a majority of the coaches had urged a return to the middle of the river. The stewards declined to make the shift because the course had already been drawn.

This means lanes one to five will pass under the second span of the railroad bridge from the west side and lanes six to 11 under the center span. This also means California will probably be out ahead in its section of the race while out in the middle of the river the other favorites will be battling in a group.

The other six teams in the variety race on the strength of season records are not figured as serious contenders. They are Columbia, Syracuse, Wisconsin, MIT, Pennsylvania and Rutgers.

### Jerry Ambler Takes First Bronc Money At Salinas

SALINAS, Calif., June 20 (AP)—Jerry Ambler of Klamath Falls, Ore., one of the nation's top rodeo riders, staked out a cut of the \$40,000 Salinas rodeo prize money today by winning the opening day bronc peeling contest.

Ambler's effort, which assured him a chance at the riding championship honors for the four-day show, was part of a rousing inaugural celebration that drew 10,000 fans yesterday. It was the first time in six years that the rodeo, formerly California's largest, had been presented.

Charles Hall and Jim Strohm of Hollister topped 37 entries in the roping contest, laying two ropes on their critter in 16.2 seconds. Buster Ivory of Hayward won the bareback riding competition.

# Oregon Alumni Open Drive For Funds

PORTLAND, June 20 (AP)—University of Oregon alumni opened a campaign here last night to raise \$600,000 for a student union building on the university campus in Eugene.

President Harry K. Newburn said ground for the building would be broken on homecoming week-end next fall. He said the total cost would be \$1,300,000, of which \$100,000 has been accumulated and \$600,000 is to come from state bonds.

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
