Klamath Historical Group Slates Basin Tour Sunday

Pages of history will be reviewed on a tour of the Klamath Historical society, scheduled for Sunday, June 22, and stirring incidents of by-gone pioneer days will be narrated, according to tentative plans for the program.
The Siskiyou historical society has been invited to join the caravan which will leave from the courthouse lawn at 9:30 o'clock on Sunday morning.
First stop on the agenda will be the Fremont bridge where a sketch of the former Eulahoma Indian village which stood there, will be given. The next stop will be made at View point a o b e Algoma where geological explanations on strata formations will be made by either Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth McCloud Jr., Williamson river, the site of Fremont's camp from which attacks on the Indian village were made in 1846, will be the next stop. Another short review will be given the Agency lookout and from there the caravan will continue on to the Klamath Indian Agency for lunch.
The first stop after lunch will be to the group at Agency landings there the LeRoy Giesner museum at Chiloquin will be visited. A stop and narrative at Fort Klamath will be made in 1846, will be the next stop. Another short review will be given the Agency lookout and from there the caravan will continue on to Crater lake from this point.
Incidental points of interest to be taken in will be the burial place of former and present Modoc warriors who were hanged at the end of the Modoc war; the Indian council grove near Fort Klamath where meetings were held and the peace treaty between the Indians and the soldiers was signed.
Old-timers among the native residents on the Klamath Indian reservation and pioneer residents of points on the tour have been invited to talk on special episodes from their memories of the early settler's days in this county. A former Fremont camp site on the Loomis ranch will be included if time permits on the trip.
The committee in charge of the Sunday trip includes Mr. and Mrs. Clyde James, Mr. and Mrs. McCloud, Jr., Hal Ogier, Mrs. Robert Odell and Mrs. Minnie Grizzle.
