Clothing Workers Contract Renewed

NEW YORK, June 21 (AP)—The New York Herald Tribune says the CIO Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America—in an effort to retain the closed shop, which would be banned by the Taft-Hartley bill—has negotiated five-year extensions of most of its current closed shop contracts.

The extended closed shop contracts, the newspaper said, cover 300,000 of the union's 350,000 members, "with most of the remaining 50,000 not involved because they are not engaged in interstate commerce and therefore would not be affected by the bill's provisions."

Methodists End Session

PORTLAND, Ore., June 21 (AP)—Bishop Bruce Richard Baxter, 54, of the Methodist church, collapsed and died last night an hour after finishing a day-long session presiding over the annual Oregon Methodist conference.

The bishop for the Portland area complained of a chest pain several times in the afternoon, but refused to leave his duties. He succumbed to a heart attack shortly after reaching his apartment.

Dr. Baxter formerly was president of Willamette university and assistant to the president of the University of Southern California. He held honorary degrees from a number of colleges, including Whitman college, Walla Walla.

He was named bishop for the 563 Methodist churches in the Portland area in 1940.

Survivors include the widow, who was with him at church, and his mother, Mrs. John Baxter, Hollywood, Calif. Funeral services will be held in the First Methodist church here Sunday at 2:30 p. m. Burial will be in Forest Lawn cemetery, Los Angeles.

Final Ship Peace Near

SAN FRANCISCO, June 21 (AP)—Nathan P. Feinsinger, ace troubleshooter for the labor department, went into contract talks with two CIO unions and the waterfront employers today in an attempt to transform the Pacific coast maritime strike into an early final settlement.

Feinsinger, who negotiated the temporary agreement which ended a four-day tieup earlier in the week, said that a final peace may require "another day or two."

Contracts covering the two remaining unions, the CIO Marine Cooks and Stewards and the American Communications association (the radio operators), are expected in general to parallel those signed with east coast unions, including a five per cent wage raise and nine paid holidays a year.

Maritime activity was back to normal today and the railroads again were moving shipments to coast ports.

A spokesman for the waterfront employers said "headway has been made in clearing the backlog of work resulting from the four-day tieup and all ships are now sailing on schedule."

Plans Asked For Swimming Pool

LAKEVIEW, June 21—A recommendation that the city park board prepare plans for construction of a swimming pool at the city park so that the approximate cost can be known and preparations pushed for construction was put forward by the swimming pool committee of the Lake County Civic Coordination council last Thursday night.

Lewis Ankeny Acquitted On Embezzlement Charge

LAKEVIEW, June 21 (AP)—Lewis H. Ankeny, former Klamath Falls stockbroker who was charged with embezzlement in a grand jury indictment last December, was found not guilty last night by a 12 man jury which returned its verdict at 9 o'clock to Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg.

Ankeny was indicted on two counts and will face trial on the second, that of larceny by bailie involving \$167,637. From Gus A. Anderson and Veva Anderson, husband and wife. No date for the trial has been set, according to Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg. Ankeny has been at liberty under \$10,000 bond and that bond has now been exonerated to \$5,000. Judge Vandenberg advised.

The jury deliberated two hours and 10 minutes, according to the court. Instructions were given by Judge Vandenberg at 5:30 p. m. yesterday following the closing arguments of the defense and prosecution. After deliberating a little over one hour the jury was taken to dinner. The 12 men returned one hour and 20 minutes later to resume their deliberations and arrived at a verdict at 9 o'clock. Ankeny remained in the court room during the hours the jury was out.

Earlier yesterday afternoon Defense Attorney Ben Anderson of Portland, presented his defense of the client and Ankeny was on the stand in his own behalf from late Friday morning until early in the afternoon. District Attorney Clarence A. Humble followed the defense in a summation of the state's case against the former stockbroker. Both Humble and Assistant District Attorney J. Hawkins Napier handled the prosecution.

The trial, complete yesterday concerned some \$1300 worth of Collins radio stock owned by Dr. George H. Merriman Sr., and allegedly converted to his own use by Ankeny. Grand jury indictments against Ankeny were returned December 4, 1944. Ben Anderson of Lord and Anderson, Portland law firm, will also represent Ankeny when he will be tried on a later date.

SALEM, June 21 (AP)—Jesse Clifford Metzger, Milwaukee, was killed early Saturday morning in an auto accident near Mill City on the North Santiam highway when the car in which he was riding collided with one driven by H. D. Hudkins of Mill City.

The driver of the Metzger car was Archie E. Hamlin of Portland. Metzger was thrown from the car by the impact, police said. His body was taken to Stayton pending removal to his home, Coroner I. F. Barrick, reports.

Police assert the trio took \$25 worth of Lewis and Clark brushes from a rear platform of Castelberry's Drug store. The firm of Roper and Roper, paint contractors, was painting the rear of the store and it was their paint and equipment which was stolen.

Italian Head Given Backing

ROME, June 21 (AP)—Premier Alcide de Gasperi's fourth government—the first to exclude communists and socialists since the liberation of Italy—won a vote of confidence from the Italian constituent assembly today by a 43-vote majority.

Umberto Terracini, communist president of the assembly, announced that of 509 deputies present, 274 voted in favor of the government, 231 against it, and four abstained.

Besides de Gasperi's Christian Democrats, the government was supported by the liberals, the monarchists and the members of Guglielmo Giannini's uomo qualunque (common man) party. Giannini, who has been accused by the left of fascist tendencies, announced just before the voting that his party was "voting in our own exclusive interests."

"We believe that this experiment will be useful to us as a party as well as to the country," Giannini said. "At last Italy has a government with a chance to govern. De Gasperi will not be able to blame any failures on sabotage by the communists within the government."

The communists, extreme left socialists, republicans and some moderate socialists voted against the government.
