

Flash Floods, Tornadoes Leave 16 Dead And Missing In Nebraska Communities

CAMBRIDGE, Neb., June 23 (AP)—Flash floods and tornadoes which caught many of their victims in bed left a toll of at least 16 dead and missing in Nebraska today as workmen sought to restore communication to isolated communities.

Hardest hit was this south-central Nebraska town, where 100 or more were drowned by a 12-foot wall of muddy water discharged from Medicine creek yesterday. An additional four were missing here.

Two others drowned 60 miles north-east of here when their car, striking a highway washout, hurtled into a flooded creek.

Caught in their beds by the dawn flash flood, many residents of this community of 1100 frantically chopped holes in roofs and climbed trees to escape the wall of water, reported to be 12 feet deep. Altogether, 198 were taken by boats and trucks from trees and house-tops.

Senate Hikes Navy Funds

WASHINGTON, June 23 (AP)—The senate appropriations committee today added \$176,500,000 today to the navy appropriation voted by the house—an increase which Senator Saltonstall (R-Mass.) declared will give the nation "a powerful, well-balanced fighting fleet."

The measure approved by the committee will give the navy:

- A personnel strength of 395,000 enlisted men and 43,000 officers; an active fleet of 293 combat ships and 9783 aircraft, exclusive of those used for reserve training.
- This is 1000 more officers and 40,000 more men than allowed by the house bill; 24 more combat ships and 253 more aircraft.

Saltonstall, chairman of the subcommittee which considered details of the program, declared the net effect of the changes voted today would be to add \$15,500,000 in usable appropriations to the sum voted by the house. He explained that while \$176,500,000 in new money was voted, the senate group rescinded an additional \$161,000,000 in carryover appropriations.

Cloudbursts ranging up to an unofficial "12 to 13 inches at Burwell, Neb., sent streams over their banks throughout the state. Along with high winds and tornadoes, these left many communities without either telephone or telegraphic communication.

In North Central Nebraska, half the town of North Loup was inundated. Flood damage about 50 miles East of Broken Bow, where the Rev. Thomas Mitchell said "12 to 13 inches" of rain fell, was estimated by Newspaper Editor George J. Porter at \$50,000. Ashland in Eastern Nebraska had its fourth flood of the year.

Harry D. Strunk, president of the Republican valley conservation association and publisher of the McCook Gazette, expressed belief the death toll will rise when all communication is restored.

Tornadoes which struck at Loomis, Oxford, and Gothenburg, Neb., injured at least nine persons and added to farm property damage to mounting crop losses. Already sodden by previous floods and incessant rains, thousands of rich cropland areas were unable to absorb the new rain, which was left standing to choke off much wheat and corn.

New System Speeds Up Messages

WASHINGTON, June 23 (AP)—NBC President Niles Trammell said today a new radio communication system has been developed which can send 1,000,000 words a minute.

He said the new system, known as ultrafax, "could transmit twenty 50,000 word novels from New York to San Francisco in only 60 seconds."

It's so speedy, the National Broadcasting company head told congress, that present communication methods will seem as "slow as the ox cart compared with a strait-liner."

Ready Soon
Ultrafax was developed by Radio Corporation of America, and will be ready for a public showing some time this summer. Trammell said this is the way it works:

"Each printed page is treated as a picture and (is) flashed in rapid succession. At the receiving

end, the pages are reproduced by a new high-speed photographic process for quick delivery.

Trammell told a senate interstate and foreign commerce sub-committee that the new process may mean that the newspaper of the future will be delivered by radio.

"Many radio broadcasters of today will become the electronic publishers of tomorrow," he predicted in his prepared testimony.

"Radio newspapers will become commonplace. Practically every form of artistic expression will become available to the people direct from studio to home."

Tourist Travel Figure Climbing

PORTLAND, June 23 (AP)—Tourist travel in Oregon is about 15 per cent above last year, the Oregon State Motor association estimated today. It predicted a record tourist year in 1947.

Shipworkers Demand Veto

SEATTLE, June 23 (AP)—The AFL-Ship Scalers union held short stop work meetings at start of the day shift at two shipyards today to sign a telegram to Sen. Harry P. Cain (R-Wash.) demanding he vote to sustain President Truman's veto of the Taft-Hartley bill.

Fred G. Berry, business agent, announced.

Two hundred signed the telegram at the Todd drydocks, stopping work from 7:30 a. m. to 7:55 a. m. and 47 signed at the Puget Sound Bridge and Dredging company in 15 minutes, he said.

"Washington labor demands that you vote to sustain the veto," the message said, in part.

Senator Cain voted for the bill when it originally passed the senate.

New Laws Go In Saturday

SALEM, June 23 (AP)—The new laws passed by the 1947 legislature will become effective on Saturday, July 5, despite Governor Earl Snell's designation of that day as a legal holiday. Attorney General George Neuner said today.

Neuner said that referendum petitions against laws passed by the legislature might be filed either by July 3 or July 7. The legal deadline is July 5, but it would be impossible to file them on that day since the state department would be closed for the holiday.

Governor Snell, when he announced last week that July 5 would be a holiday, said he would issue a proclamation, but this proclamation has not yet been issued. The federal reserve system notified Secretary of State Robert S. Farrel Jr., it would order its member banks to close July 5 when it received a certified copy of the proclamation.

Vet Burial Law Announced

SALEM, June 23 (AP)—A remarried World War II widow of a member of the armed forces now interred overseas has the right to decide where her former husband shall be finally interred; a widow who was divorced or separated from her husband at the time of his death, moreover, also forfeits this right.

These statements were made today by Lt. Col. Vernon L. Lewis, chief of the American graves registration division for the Pacific Northwest, Auburn, Wash. Lewis requested remarried widows of World War II deceased now interred overseas to write a letter to Memorial Division, Quartermaster General, Washington 25, D. C., indicating their change of status. "Her own written statement to the effect that she has remarried will constitute proof that she is no longer the legal next of kin. The war department will then determine the succeeding legal next of kin in accordance with the precedence established by the secretary of war."

Photographer Dies Of Heart Attack

SALEM, June 23 (AP)—Ralph I. Gifford, 53, chief photographer for the Oregon state highway commission, died of a heart attack in Ontario today, the commission announced.

Gifford's pictures of Oregon scenery have been published in newspapers and magazines throughout the United States. His colored motion picture, "The New Oregon Trail" showing Oregon's scenery, also has been shown throughout the country.

He leaves a widow and a son, both of Salem.
