

Jim Ferrier Picks Up PGA Crown; Snapp Kayoes Stanley In Fourth

A Harbert Beaten 2 And 1

DETROIT, June 25 (AP)—Tall, dark, shouldered Jim Ferrier, Australian-born chip and putt master, won the PGA championship today after whipping homebred Melvin (Chick) Harbert of Northville, Mich., 2 and 1, in the "battle of the holes" for the American PGA championship.

Ferrier, who has won a major national championship since he left Australia in 1939 after four triumphs in the Australian amateur and two in the Australian open, roomed into fourth place in the 1947 money parade by pocketing the \$3500 top prize here for his first tournament victory of the year.

In running his tournament earnings to \$9669.15 since the first of the year, the gum-chewing, club-mangling Ferrier played approximately 12 rounds in a week over the last month, his club's long, tricky 9222 yard layout at an aggregate of 27 strokes under par or 204 holes.

Ferrier required just 54 putts in his match with Harbert, dropping six of them at distances ranging from 15 to 55 feet.

Ferrier, whose No. 1 performance in match play prior to his victory was reaching the finale of the 1936 British amateur before losing to Hector Thomson, never called Harbert after the 18th hole in their morning round when he took even for the fourth time.

They were all square at lunch, Ferrier with 35-36-71, one under par, and Harbert with 34-36-70.

Braves Pitching May Bring National Flag To Boston

Pitchers Warren Spahn and Johnny Sain of the pennant-starved Boston Braves threatened today to eclipse the modern National League record number of victories hung up by two pitchers of the same club in one season.

With 20 wins already, Spahn and Sain, upon whom Braves followers are dependent to bring them their first flag in 33 years, stand a fighting chance to better the mark of the team.

Ed Ryan, head Pelican football coach, recently made a trip to Boise, Idaho, to glean some information on the Boise high school grid squad, whom the Pelicans will meet in Boise next November 1.

Ryan netted several facts by digging through old newspaper files, and found that the Braves, as the Boise team is called, have built up an impressive record for themselves.

Ryan said that the Braves have not lost a home game for as far back as he could find, and last season they scored 300 points to their opponents' 71, averaging 45 points per game for the first four games.

Their playing schedule last year included such schools as Pocatello, Idaho Falls, Caldwell, Twin Falls, La Grande and Walla Walla.

The only comparison that can be drawn from this schedule in relation to the local team is the La Grande tilt, which Boise won 34-13.

La Grande defeated The Dalles, who were in turn defeated by the Pelicans by some 50 points.

The Braves are coached by Bob Gibbs, who works his squad from a "T" formation. Their colors are red and white, as are the Pelicans.

They will run a team average weight of about 175 pounds, and Ryan, in a far-sighted guess, estimated that his team's weight would average around 354.

The Braves have a well supplied reserve strength, Ryan reported, and he looks for a real battle, since Coach Gibbs will have a wealth of material returning.

SEATTLE, June 25 (AP)—Sturdy Phil Palmer, 144-pound Vancouver, B. C. battler, retained his Northwest welterweight crown last night in turning in a grueling 10-round decision over Arturo Barron, 140, of Los Angeles.

Palmer picked up the win on points as he banged repeated rights into the Barron mid-section despite a cut eye which the Californian opened in the fourth round and concentrated upon thereafter.

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Welter Battle Doyle Badly Injured In Loss To Robinson

CLEVELAND, June 25 (AP)—Jimmy Doyle lost his bid for the world's welterweight title last night but was fighting a bigger battle for his life in Charity hospital today after undergoing an operation for removal of a blood clot on his brain.

The stricken fighter was still unconscious and attendants at the hospital said his condition remained critical. Oxygen was being administered to aid his breathing.

The Rev. James W. Nagel, hospital chaplain, administered the last rites of the Catholic church.

The operation was performed by Dr. Spencer Braden, noted Cleveland brain specialist.

Doyle was carried from the arena ring on a stretcher and rushed to the hospital after Welterweight Champion Ray (Sugar) Robinson floored him with a vicious left hook in the eighth round of a scheduled 15-round championship bout before 11,375.

Hospital attendants said he apparently was suffering from respiratory paralysis as a blood clot and concussion. Effects of the operation could not be determined immediately.

He was placed beneath an oxygen tent and carbon dioxide and oxygen were being given continuously.

After Robinson delivered the blow, Doyle fell flat on his back, unconscious. Referee Jackie Davis started the count but the bell ending the round sounded when Davis' roll reached nine.

Dr. Arthur Hagedorn, Cleveland boxing commission physician, and Doyle's handlers were unable to revive him.
