

# Bush Scoffs Push Button War Rumors

WASHINGTON, June 25 (AP)—Dr. Vannevar Bush said that talk of "push button" warfare is harming the country.

He told the house expenditures committee that anyone who expects a "precise 5000-mile missile" overnight would "believe in Santa Claus," adding:

"If we got into war tomorrow, it would be a tough, rough slugging match like the one we just got out of."

He said America would use the weapons it had at the end of World War II, plus some new developments of the last two years.

Bush, who heads the government's research and scientific program established during the war, testified in favor of a bill to unify the armed forces under a single cabinet officer.

Rep. Wilson (R-Tex.) remarked that at least one witness has said new weapons are making airplanes obsolete and that the air forces would retard research and development that might put them out of business.

"That just strikes me as funny," Bush replied, raising a cloud of smoke from a briar pipe.

"In your opinion, the large bomber is no more obsolete than the large battleship?" inquired Rep. Dorn (D-S.C.).

"Of course not," the scientist answered.

## Air Freight To Mexico Started

SEATTLE, June 25 (AP)—A Northern Airlines twin engine air freighter took off Tuesday morning for Mexico City with 4000 pounds of frozen foods, inaugurating air freight service between Seattle and the Mexican capital.

The plane was scheduled to stop at Portland, Ore., for an additional 2000 pounds of dressed chicken. Mexican officials were to meet the aircraft at Los Angeles and accompany the flight to Mexico City. The company said the first shipment was for resorts in the Mexico City area and that later flights would be made to Mazatlan and Acapulco.

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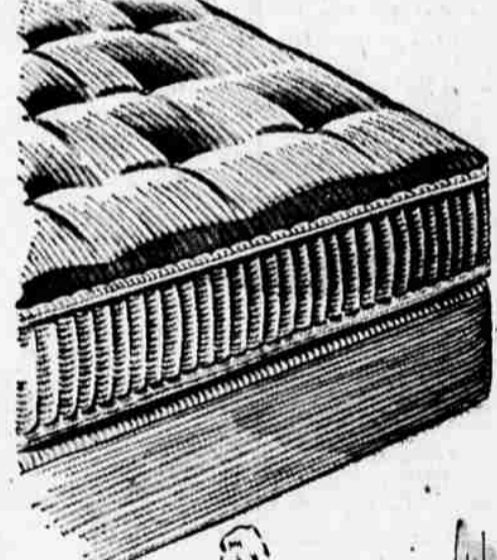
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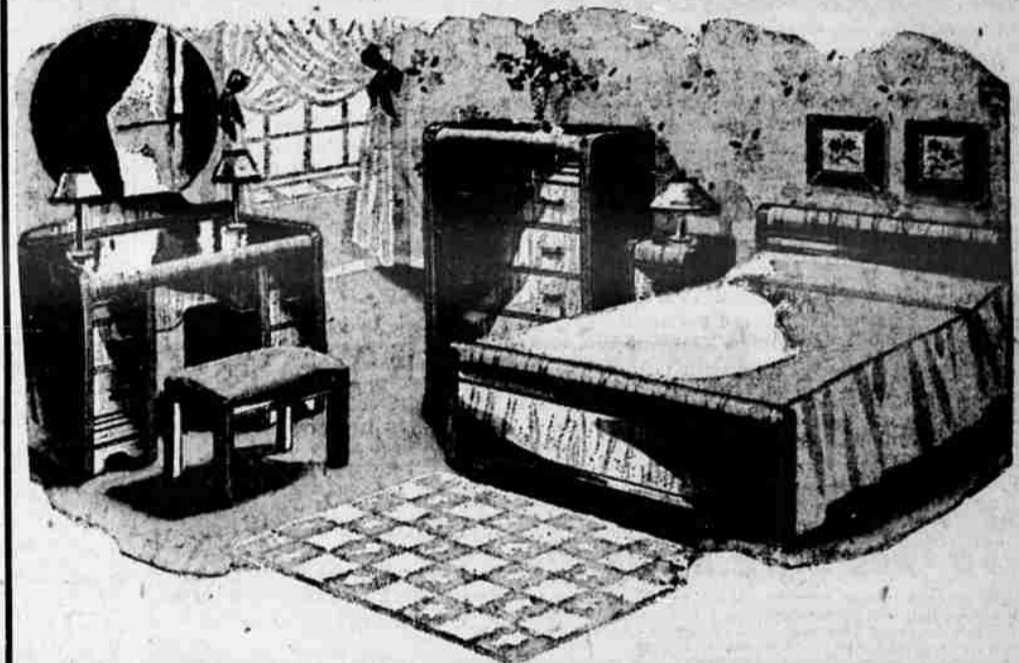
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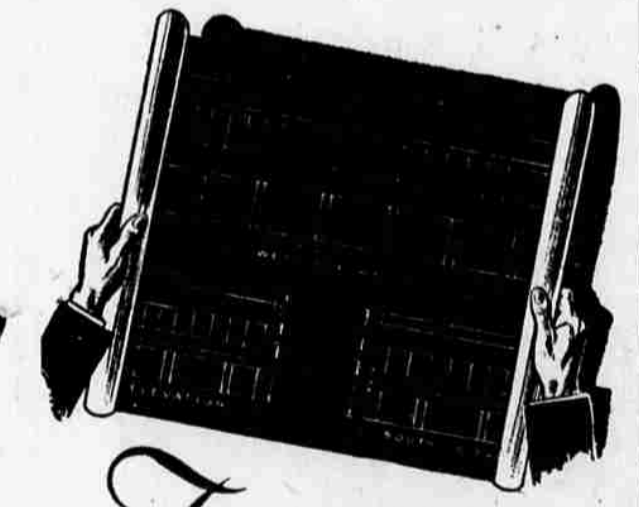
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
