

Balkan Probe Blames Yugos For Incidents

LAKE SUCCESS, June 25 (AP)—The United Nations Balkan investigation commission's report holding Yugoslavia primarily to blame for the perpetration of guerrilla warfare inside Greece was made public today.

The commission's findings and recommendations, already made known in dispatches from Geneva, were expected to precipitate a showdown between Russia and the western powers in the security council on the perennial Balkan problem.

Covering a three-months inquiry into the Balkan situation, the 230,000-word document was formally submitted to members of the security council last Saturday.

The council was expected to begin a discussion of the report either Friday or early next week. There was speculation that the United States might inject into the debate the communist assumption of power in Hungary and communist moves in Bulgaria.

Red-Pole Dissension

With Russia and Poland dissenting and France abstaining, the Balkan commission fixed upon Yugoslavia the primary blame for support of Greek guerrilla warfare, and held Albania and Bulgaria blameworthy to a lesser degree.

Disturbed political and economic conditions and the persecution of minorities inside Greece were cited in the commission's report as contributing factors to the turbulent Balkan situation.

As a means toward alleviating this situation the commission recommended that the security council establish a commission or commissioner on the troubled frontier area of Greece for at least two years to observe incidents and settle disputes.

Such a commission or commissioner should, if established, report to the council every three months, and should have access to Albania, Greece, Yugoslavia and Bulgaria, the report said.

Corn Hits Record High

CHICAGO, June 25 (AP)—Corn advanced to a new all-time record high on the board of trade today as buying entered the pit on pessimistic reports concerning the crop outlook in Iowa, major producing state. Gains ranged to 5 cents a bushel at times.

Only steady during most of the session, corn jumped sharply in the last hour on reports Iowa would have the poorest crop in 10 years. Strength in the yellow grain was reflected in oats, which cancelled early losses and moved ahead for mostly fractional gains.

Wheat tended to lag with small losses most of the session. The market encountered hedging pressure.

Toward the close, wheat rallied to end 1/4-1/2 higher than yesterday's finish. July \$2.17 1/4-1/2. July corn touched an all time peak of \$2.02 1/4. Final corn prices were 2 1/4-4 1/2 higher, July \$2.02-2.02 1/2, and oats were 1/2-3/4 higher, July 98-97 1/2.

After Mrs. Meddlin's third child was born in Grants Pass, June 14—there is one older daughter, born to Mrs. Meddlin and an unidentified Marysville soldier, July 2, 1944, in Nevada City, Calif.—she said that she and Gilreath decided to get rid of Mary Jane.

Picture Recognized

Mrs. Meddlin and Gilreath have been living in Selma for several months. A neighbor recognized Mary Jane's picture in a newspaper and gave state police the tip that broke the case. It was one of hundreds of leads which officers in Oregon and California ran to earth during their 10-day hunt for the solution to the crime.

Both Gilreath and Mrs. Meddlin signed their statements in Grants Pass. Gilreath waived extradition to California.

In denying that he beat the child, Gilreath told Deputy Sheriff Thorne West he left her in a parked car at Weed, and described two men he said he had seen park the car and leave. The tot was discovered some 10 hours later back of the dance hall.

However, a blood-stained white shirt was found at the home in Selma, and Mrs. Meddlin identified it as the one Gilreath was wearing when he took the child away.

Mrs. Meddlin is a native of Missouri, but during the war came to Marysville, Calif. There she said she met a soldier who became the father of her first daughter. Less than a month after the birth of that child, she married a Virgil Meddlin in Reno. That was on August 1, 1944. Meddlin was the father of Mary Jane, she said. The Meddlin's separated later and Lucille Meddlin went to Indianapolis, Ind., where she met Gilreath in June, 1946.

Came Back West

At that time Mrs. Meddlin had her oldest child, Leona, with her, and Mary Jane was staying with grandparents in Empire, Calif. Soon after, both Gilreath and Mrs. Meddlin came back west, she goes to Modesto and Gilreath to Selma, Ore.

In July Gilreath went to Modesto and brought Mrs. Meddlin, Leona and Mary Jane to Selma. There they lived as man and wife, according to Mrs. Meddlin, and Gilreath worked in a sawmill.

When Mrs. Meddlin learned that she was pregnant last December, she and Gilreath talked of disposing of Mary Jane.

Gilreath is a native of Jellico, Tenn., but has worked in lumber mills in Oregon for several years.

Still in Hospital

The little flaxen-haired girl, almost fully recovered from her ordeal, is still in the Siskiyou General hospital at Yreka. She is just over 18 months old.
