

Protests Arrests in Romania

WASHINGTON, June 25 (AP)—The United States protested sharply to the Romanian government today against the "arbitrary arrest without warrant or charge" of "hundreds" of opposition party members and others.

A note said that the arrests appeared to represent "a deliberate effort at the suppression of terrorist intimidation of democratic elements" opposing the present communist-dominated regime.

Note Made Public

The state department made public the note which Roy M. Melbourne, acting United States representative at Bucharest, has been instructed to deliver to the Romanian foreign minister.

The note said that the arrests appeared to violate formal assurances given by Romanian officials that public liberties would be safeguarded. It said further that "such evident deprivation of the most elementary human rights and fundamental freedoms" conflicted with terms of the Romanian peace treaty.

This treaty has been signed by the Romanian government and ratified by the United States.

Dam Hearing Starts Today

WALLA WALLA, June 25 (AP)—A two-day hearing on a department of interior proposal for a 10-year moratorium on new dam construction along the Columbia and Snake rivers opened here today with fishing interests lined up against the opposition of power, navigation and irrigation proponents.

Col. Theron D. Weaver, North Pacific division engineer for the army engineers and chairman of the sponsoring Columbia basin interagency committee, said the proposal would permit the fish and wildlife service to "prosecute a program for improvements of the lower Columbia with a view to protecting and enhancing the fish life."

Weaver said representatives of the fishing industry would open testimony today.

Approval of the proposal would temporarily forestall eight potential projects on the Columbia below the Okanogan, and six on the Snake below the Salmon river, Weaver said.

Up-river projects would be pushed as an interim alternative.

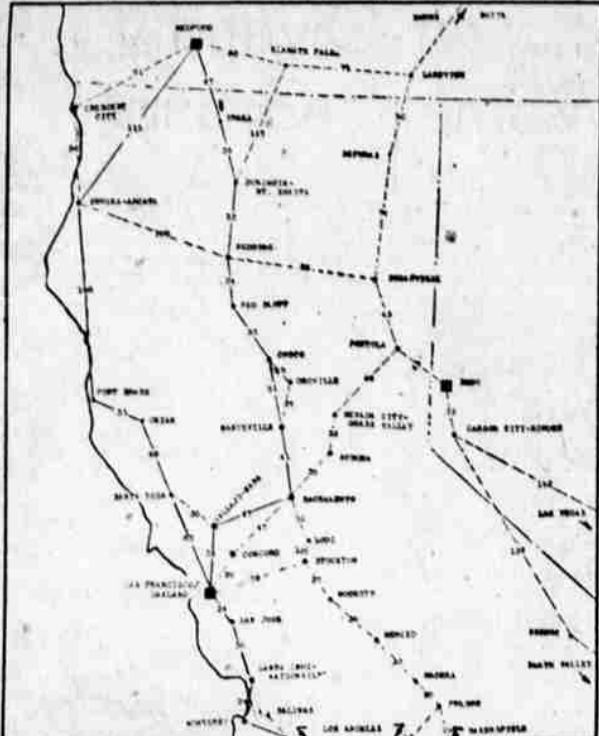

MEMPHIS, Tenn., June 25 (AP)—General Sessions Judge William Bacon has ruled that it's okay for ladies to sun themselves in their backyards in tubed shorts and halter, and that neighbors who want to make anything of it are apt to get in trouble themselves.

A 38-year-old woman called police to complain about four young ladies next door sun-bathing in "indecent attire."

A squad car officer, told to look out for "naked women getting too much exposure," investigated and placed the ladies in brief but accepted sports saris.

Japs Given Stiff Jolts

YOKOHAMA, June 25 (AP)—A U. S. eighth army military commission today imposed sentences totaling 42 years—all at hard labor—on five Japanese convicted of war crimes.

Stiffest sentence—30 years—was given Sotouemon Hosoi, one-time civilian employer at the Nagoya area prisoner of war camp. He was convicted of beating, burning and torturing American captives.

Katsunouke Watanabe was cleared of charges he contributed to the deaths of six allied prisoners, but drew 12 years at hard labor for mistreating internees.

Aijaku Suyenaga, former Dukuoka camp doctor, went on trial charged with contributing to the death of Sgt. Leon R. Stewart of Opportunity, Wis., by refusing him medical care and requiring him to work while ill.

ROSEBURG, Ore., June 25 (AP)—Garwood Norman Sheldon, 92, retired superintendent of street lighting for the city of Seattle, died here last night after a long illness. He and the late Mrs. Sheldon came here in 1931 after his 30 years' service with the Seattle light department.

The Las Vegas chamber of commerce is trying to remain neutral, and says Nevada road maps will designate it "Boulder dam" (Hoover).

DP Proposal Voted Down

NEW YORK, June 25 (AP)—The General Federation of Women's Clubs at its 56th annual convention, today voted down 346 to 341 a resolution approving pending congressional legislation which would admit 100,000 European displaced persons a year to the United States.

The spirited debate period preceding the vote was marked by boos, hisses and loud applause.

First to speak in opposition to the resolution was Miss Popkita Rabell, of Opa Locka, Fla., who said that "charity begins at home" and urged that no immigration be allowed when the United States was faced with "growing unemployment."

Another speaker, Miss Alves Long, of Columbia, S. C., asked that the resolution be approved on the ground that "the United States needs more population; these people fought for freedom."

WASHINGTON, June 25 (AP)—The census bureau today described Imperial county, Calif., as the nation's leading alfalfa-growing county in an analysis of data from its latest (1945) farm census.

Maricopa, Ariz.; Weld, Colo.; Ottertail, Minn.; Fresno, Merced, Tulare, Kern and Stanislaus, all in California, and Yakima, Wash.

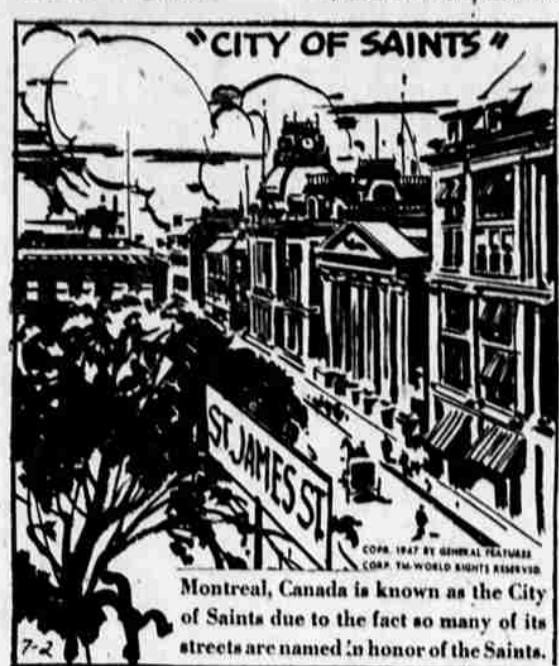

Mechanics Go On Strike

SEATTLE, June 25 (AP)—A strike of 800 mechanics closed 40 automobile dealers' repair shops here today.

Members of the automotive machinists' union lodge 289 (Ind.) rejected a 15-cent-an-hour wage increase offered by the Seattle Automotive Dealers Association. The union asked a 25-cent increase, or \$1.75 an hour.

Not affected by the strike are approximately 300 independent repair shops in Seattle.

Business Agent S. P. Lewis said the union did not expect to establish picket lines "at least for the first few days," and new car departments were expected to continue operation.
