

European Aid Plan Not "Blank Check"

WASHINGTON, June 25 (AP)—Secretary of State Snyder made plain today that he does not view the Marshall plan for European recovery as giving foreign countries a blank check on the United States for what they need.

Snyder told a news conference that Secretary of State Marshall has not extended an implied invitation to other countries to tell this nation "what they need or want."

"My interpretation is that he is asking them to make a self-inventory and see what they can do for themselves," Snyder told reporters.

Not Representative
Meanwhile, Marshall said at another news conference that he does not plan to have a representative attend the talks of British, French and Russian foreign ministers concerning his European recovery program.

These discussions are scheduled to begin in Paris Friday. Asked whether he plans to have an observer there, Marshall said he does not.

He flatly declined to give out any more information now about these proposals. When a questioner referred to the program as "your proposal" Marshall interrupted quickly to say the reporter meant the American government proposal.

Marshall projected the program in a speech at Harvard university June 5 when he said that future American dollar aid to European countries should be conditioned on a continent-wide plan of economic reconstruction drafted by "a number, if not all European nations."

Snyder said he gave this interpretation to Marshall's proposal. "He invited them to sit down and see what the problem is. He didn't say anything about letting the United States know how much is wanted. He said they should get together and make up their own minds as to what they ought to do in their own countries."

Italy May Get Ships

WASHINGTON, June 25 (AP)—Secretary of State Marshall said today the United States wants to turn over 31 merchant vessels to non-communist Italy in an effort to reconstruct that country.

Marshall made the statement at a news conference when a reporter asked whether turning over such ships is not an unusual action to take toward a former enemy country.

The secretary said it most certainly is, but that the main consideration is to do something to help rehabilitate Italy. He added that Americans are bit more generous and forgiving than most people.

Marshall said that under legislation pending before congress 18 vessels proposed to be handed over to the Italians are surplus American liberty ships. They would replace Italian ships lost during the war while under American control. The senate foreign relations committee approved the legislation yesterday and sent it to the senate for consideration.

Attorneys Appeal Curley Decision

WASHINGTON, June 25 (AP)—Attorneys for Mayor James M. Curley of Boston, sentenced to 18 months in jail on mail fraud charges, asked federal district court today to suspend sentence because of his "most serious and precarious physical condition."

The 72-year-old political leader who came here last night from a Cohasset, Mass., hospital where he had been undergoing treatment for diabetes and high blood pressure, is scheduled to appear in court tomorrow morning for commitment to jail.

Lakeview To Sponsor Airshow

New Floods Sweep Over Iowa Towns

OMAHA, June 25 (AP)—Residents of Iowa and Nebraska primed themselves for new floods today, in the wake of widespread rain.

The new precipitation came even before the old flood waters had run their downstream course.

The heaviest downpour was recorded in Northeast Nebraska, where the rain measured four inches in the Lehigh area. Much lighter rain fell over the rest of the two state area.

With the rain came more difficulties for flood stricken towns engaged in cleanup and reconstruction work. At Cambridge, Neb., the hardest hit town in Sunday's deluge, Mayor Lloyd C. Richardson declared: "Our need is getting greater all the time. It is raining here again. It is not a hard rain, but adds to our misery."

Evacuation Eyed
Richardson said the entire flooded area of Cambridge might have to be evacuated again if the rains did not stop. He explained that last Sunday's flood left the Medicine creek bed so badly silted up that a very little rainfall might mean a repetition of the week-end disaster. The rain also made the mud wet and slimy underfoot.

Similar conditions prevailed in virtually every other flooded section.

In Iowa, a new flood struck Adel, in the south central part of the state, last night. The Raccoon river, rising at the rate of one foot an hour forced some residents to seek higher ground.

The body of Carroll County Supervisor George S. Wieland of Carroll, Ia., was found in the Raccoon river near Auburn, Ia. He had been missing since Monday when he started on an inspection trip of flooded farm land.

Danger Points Watched
In Nebraska, three definite danger points were being watched today.

The Eastern Platte valley, in East Central Nebraska was alerted for floods from North Bend to the river mouth—a distance of more than 50 miles.

The Elkhorn valley of Northeast Nebraska was getting the first of a new series of floods. Early today the North Fork river spilled over near Pierce and Pilger, Neb.

The Elkhorn was expected to flood the Norfolk, Neb., area about mid-morning, but observers did not believe the high waters would reach the town. Stanton, Neb., was also threatened.

A close watch was being kept on the Missouri river near Stulo in Southeastern Nebraska, where the Missouri river stage was approaching an all time high.
