

Lake Washington Whipped By Practicing Oarsmen

SEATTLE, June 26 (AP)—Ninety-oars and a dozen coaching launches whipped the blue waters of a froth today beyond the University of Washington shellhouse, where 12 college crews were getting the feel of western air and western water in preparation for Saturday's second annual Lake Washington regatta.

Late in getting out on the broad lake yesterday and handicapped by a rising wind, the muscle men of the fragile galleys were set for double workouts today. The big old pond in Seattle's back yard was due for more oar agitation than it has experienced since the last Indian tribe went out on its last war canoe foray.

The 11 crews which came by special train—UCLA arrived by air from California—made short work of unloading their shell cars yesterday but the job of rigging the boats took most of the afternoon. By the time the shells were ready for the water a sharp wind was spanking the lake and the crews continued their "shakedown" cruises to the sheltered water close to quarters.

Each coach has been provided with a launch in which to follow his charges and these go out deeply loaded with assistants and observers. Eight of the assistants are "home grown"—graduates of the university here—and the shellhouse has been crowded since their arrival with old friends.

The head men and their coxswains have previewed the 2000-meter course and found it satisfactory. It follows the lake's west shoreline closely, with Mercer island guarding against offshore winds, and there were no objections to the lane assignments. These were drawn by school representatives a week ago.

Reading along the lanes, from the shore stretch outward, the crews will be Princeton, Syracuse, California, UCLA, Washington, Harvard, Yale, Wisconsin, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Columbia, Pennsylvania and Cornell.

Camp director is Bob Gamage, field executive of Benton, who is assisted by John Haffetto, field executive for Lake and Pit river districts. Waterfront director is Earl Graham. Outpost counselor is Delbert Yantis. Merle Weidman will be activities counselor and boat counselor is to be Wright Carleton.

Troops are urged to make their reservations as soon as possible as the schedule is filling up rapidly.

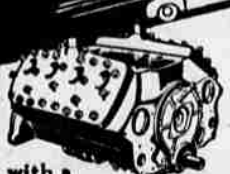
Medalists Win First Rounds

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College Golf Tourney Gets Match Shift

ANN ARBOR, Mich., June 26 (AP)—The nation's 64 blue-ribbon college golfers, who survived a rugged three-day 36-hole qualifying round, today entered match play which was scaled down by National Collegiate Athletic association officials to a single 18-hole tour.

This program shift, which merely postponed until Friday a 36-hole match play grind originally scheduled to begin today, was ordered by tournament Chairman Ted Payson, of Northwestern university, because he felt the record-breaking field of 280 collegians had been "pushed pretty hard through the first three days."

From this pressurized qualifying round emerged Louisiana State university with its first clear title to an NCAA team championship on the basis of a four-man aggregate score.

The Tiger quartet of Jim Wittenberg, Joe Moore Jr., Gardner Dickson and Jack Coyle turned in a 696 stroke total, eight strokes better than the Duke university Blue Devils, who were two points ahead of Stanford (616), last year's champions.

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Marshall Standing Firm On Antarctic Whaling Trip

WASHINGTON, June 26 (AP)—Secretary of State Marshall made plain today that the U. S. will go ahead with plans for a Japanese-manned whaling expedition to the Antarctic despite protests from four nations.

Marshall told a news conference that objections raised by Britain, Australia, New Zealand and Norway cite, among other things, past Japanese disregard of international regulations to prevent waste. He commented that in the 1947-48 expedition care will be taken to see that all regulations are carefully observed.

Britain has objected also that the whaling expedition might be a step toward reviving Japan's navy. Marshall noted that Japanese-manned ships have taken an active part in returning millions of Japanese soldiers from overseas points to their homeland, and have visited many allied ports without incident.

The expedition's prospective catch, he said, will prevent a direct cost to the U. S. in added occupation expenses of more than \$10,000,000 and also loss of approxi-

mately \$6,000,000 in foreign exchange from the sale of whale oil.

Marshall gave his endorsement to an announcement by General Douglas MacArthur's headquarters of plans for the expedition.

Yankees Buy Lonnie Frey

NEW YORK, June 26 (AP)—The New York Yankees Wednesday announced the purchase of infielder Linus (Lonnie) Frey from the Chicago Cubs for an undisclosed amount in a straight cash deal.

A left-handed hitter, Frey batted .246 with Cincinnati Reds last season, playing 111 games at second base. He was bought early this year by the Cubs, the team which had traded him to Cincinnati in 1938.
