**Aerial Photography**  
A P-38 of the Aero Exploration company is being used at Klamath airport and will probably be here for the next month. Ray Miller, pilot, and Jim Hanford, photographer, are here on a government contract taking aerial pictures of Shasta National forest for the department of the interior. They made pictures last year of the forest area and will probably make some retakes this year.

## Access Road Action Asked By Chamber

Decision to press on every possible front for the immediate reconstruction of the Diamond lake highway as an access road to Diamond lake timber was taken at a meeting of the directors of the Klamath County chamber of commerce Wednesday noon.

The action was based on a recommendation by the industrial development committee, which pointed out that the Painted Hills-Spanner interests of Klamath Falls have acquired 50,000,000 feet of forest service timber in the lake area on a government promise that the road will be put into shape for removal of the timber from forest to railroad.

Although the road job was a part of the general understanding with the local industry, government authorities have since indicated some question about going ahead with the highway program. George Davis, reporting for the committee at the chamber session, said that the committee took the view that chamber action on the matter would not be inconsistent with the economy views of members of the board. He said that the government will get the money back in the sale of the timber, for which a high bid was submitted by the local industry.

The chamber office will make immediate contact with Senator Guy Cordon regarding the question. The money to be used on the road is a part of the forest highway fund, and the government officials indicated many months ago that the cash was available, it was stated.

These charts are the only officially recognized air maps used by pilots throughout the United States.

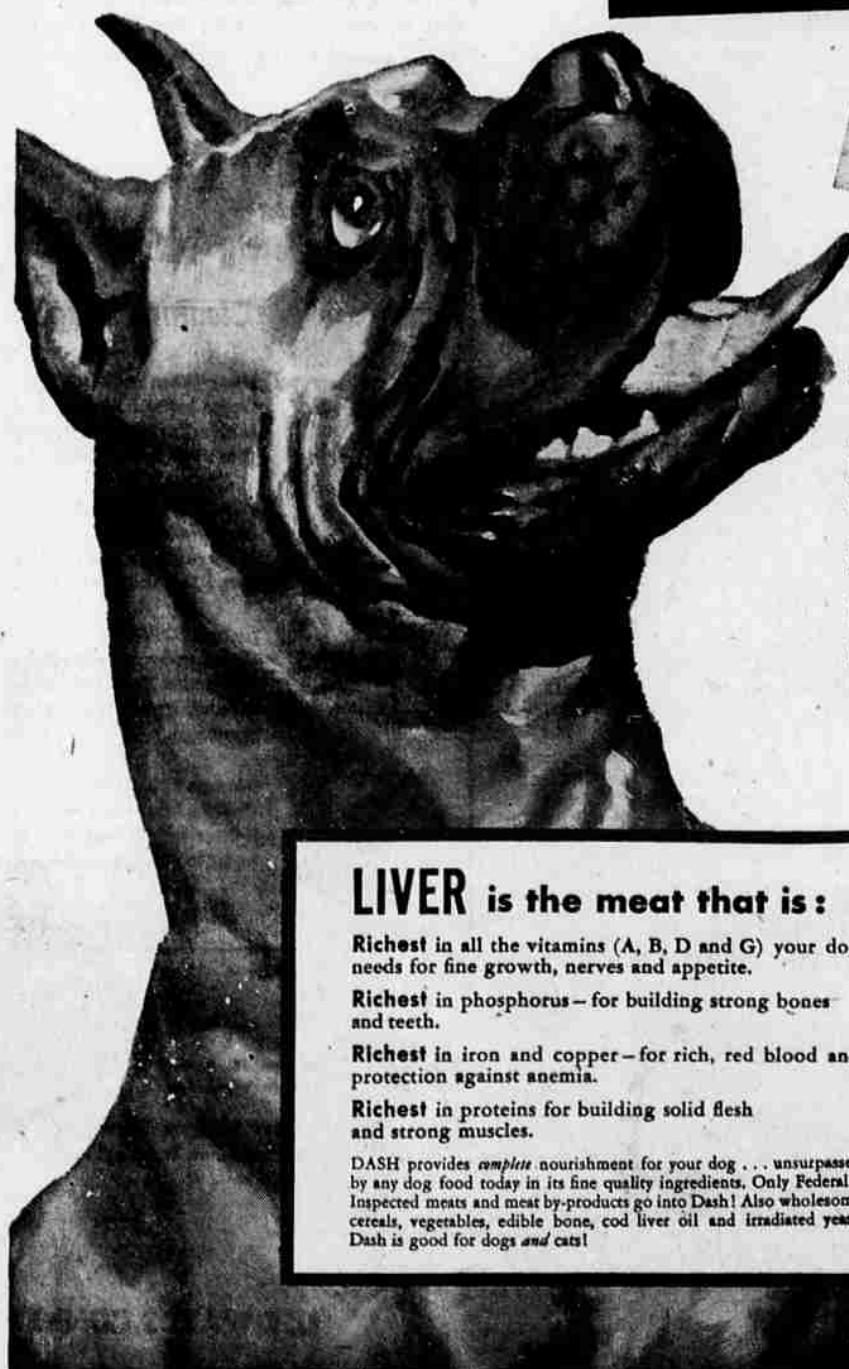
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
