

Progressive Architecture Magazine Carries Story On Klamath City-County Jail

A description of the architectural plans for the Klamath City-County jail appears in the June issue of "Progressive Architecture," a nationally distributed New York City publication.

Sheldon Brumbaugh is the architect on the city-county jail, which has been financed but not yet started, and his story and drawings by L. R. Swansen, Klamath Falls artist, fill two pages in the magazine.

The picture at the top of the article shows the plot plan, including the proposed development of a large city park on Lake Ewauna. The jail site is at Fourth and Klamath. Other illustrations include two views of the exterior of the building, and a complete set of floor plans.

The story with the pictures follows:

"The site is a full city block adjoining the county courthouse and the area allocated for Klamath Falls new civic center and park. The building is oriented so that all interior rooms receive sunlight, and a plan has been worked out for enlightened jail administration after consultation over a two-year period with authorities throughout the country, throughout the needs of both city and county (and thereby obtaining a better building than either of them could afford alone). The building is planned in conjunction with a complete program of work, recreation, rehabilitation, and medical care. In place of a full-time jailer, the chief of police and the county sheriff assume the joint responsibility of managing the jail.

College Gets New Building

First indications of improved construction conditions came with opening of bids for a new electrical engineering building at OSC by the state board of higher education. General and electrical bids were below latest estimates although far higher than those made when the state building program was formulated.

Construction is now scheduled to begin early this summer on this \$850,000 project and on the women's dormitory contracted earlier for about \$1,500,000. Both are to be ready by fall of 1948. The engineering building is the first contract to be let with funds for buildings voted by the people two years ago.

The state board also approved a final location for the big basketball pavilion and auditorium, final plans for which may now be drawn. It is to be financed from a bond issue backed by student building fees and income from the building.

Ike Urges Canadian Cooperation

WASHINGTON, June 26 (AP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower told congress Wednesday that if the United States has another war one of the first things the enemy will do is strike through the air at the industrial centers near the Great Lakes.

For that reason, the army chief of staff said, it is vital to the security of this country that United States and Canadian armed forces be prepared to cooperate completely.

He declared emphatically, too, that the Western Hemisphere should organize now for defense.

Eisenhower testified before the house foreign affairs committee in support of legislation authorizing United States aid to standardize the arms of all American nations.

\$10,000,000 Program

Last week, Secretary of State Marshall, former army chief of staff, told the house group he thought the proposed program could be carried out for \$10,000,000 a year.

Eisenhower mentioned no specific cities, but in the Great Lakes region are Chicago, Detroit, Cleveland and other centers which were big producers of the weapons used in defeating Nazi Germany.

Appearing with Eisenhower in

support of the legislation were Secretary of the Navy Forrestal and Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, chief of naval operations. They confirmed that if the legislation is enacted the navy proposes to trade new warships to Latin-American nations in exchange for obsolete ones.

Soviet Meteor Held Fact

FLAGSTAFF, Ariz., June 26 (AP)—Dr. H. H. Nininger, director of the American Meteorite Museum near here, said today he had received official verification from the meteorite committee of the Russian Academy of Sciences, Moscow, that a meteorite of great size fell near Vladivostok, Siberia, February 12.
