

"Blue Sky Hotel" Readied For Party

LAKEVIEW, Ore., June 26—Lake County's famed "Blue Sky Hotel" on Hart mountain will become the hub of national hi-jinks and hula-hoos July 18, 19, and 20 when the Order of the Antelope holds forth with its annual convention.

The order was formed 17 years ago to promote the establishment of the Hart Mountain Antelope refuge. This end was gained by presidential proclamation December 21, 1936 and today the refuge is the summer, fall and spring range of nearly 10,000 antelope. The order has continued to meet every year, except during the war years, and because the convention is unique among Western hospitality events, it attracts many men of national status.

Chief White Tail Bob Weir of Lakeview has sounded the tribal call, and this week hundreds of invitations were in the mail. Personal bids to the convention have been extended from Portland to Chicago, New York, and Washington, D. C. by Francis Lambert of Portland, Multnomah county treasurer, who is Antelope tribe's King of the Desert.

Those who have answered Lambert's call so far are United States Senator Wayne Morse, Associate Justice William O. Douglas of the United States supreme court who became a member last year, Joe Carson who is a member of the maritime commission and former mayor of Portland, and Secretary Julius Krug of the interior department.

Expected to attend are Ham Fisher of New York, creator of the Joe Pooka comic strip; Stewart Symington, assistant secretary of war; Clark Gifford, private attorney for President Truman; Dr. Paul Raver, head of the Bonville administration; James Conzelmann of Chicago, coach of the Chicago Cubs; E. Palmer Host, editor and publisher of the Denver Post and former editor of the Portland Oregonian; and Nelson B. Phillips of New York, vice president of the Manufacturers Trust company.

Elks to Attend

At least 12 grand lodge officers of the Elks have accepted invitations, as well as Claude M. Snow, exalted ruler of the Portland Elks lodge and Robert M. Farrell Jr., Oregon secretary of state and officer of the Oregon Elks.

M. Brenne of the Eugene chamber is arranging a special bus.

At noon that day, at the Pine Tavern in Bend, trekkers will be the guests of the Bend chamber of commerce. They will continue to Summer Lake lodge for another water hole stop before continuing to Lakeview.

Those coming from the north-east will refresh at the Arrow Head hotel in Burns as guests of the Burns chamber, and those from the south will find a water hole at the Golden Eagle hotel in Redding where Tom Stanley, manager of the Shasta-Cascade Wonderland association, will be in charge.

All will find a water hole in Lakeview, as well as a Friday night entertainment for the visitors, Saturday morning, activities will be started with a buckaroo break-

Curley Must Serve Term

WASHINGTON, June 26 (AP)—Judge James M. Proctor refused today to suspend Boston Mayor James M. Curley's jail sentence and ordered that Curley begin serving the six to 18 months in prison immediately.

Justice James M. Proctor said "I regard the case as ended as far as the court is concerned."

"I think he (Curley) should be committed today."

The judge denied a plea of defense attorneys that the 72-year-old mayor be given a few days to clear up pressing municipal matters.

Curley, the judge declared, can settle the handling of any immediate city matters "with his keepers."

Defense attorneys told the court that a jail sentence at this time might well have a "fatal termination," but Proctor was unmoved. Then Curley's attorneys asked

that the mayor be permitted to say a few words to the court.

The judge declined their request, saying "I do not think any good purpose would be served by further statement to this court."

Curley's attorneys had asked for suspension of the sentence on grounds that he is in a "most serious and precarious physical condition." He left a Massachusetts hospital to come here and appear in court.
