

Two Ex-GI's Slip Past Guards To Spend Night At Buckingham Palace

LONDON, June 27 (AP)—It seems there were a couple of ex-GI's looking for a place to sleep last night, and they walked past a big gray building, and—

"Buckingham Palace," murmured John L. Jensen, 34, of North Bend, Ore.

"Why not?" answered Wallace McCall, 25, of Portland, Ore.

Buckingham Palace is protected by an eight and one-half foot wall.

"It took us half an hour to get over the wall," said Jensen, a recent journalism graduate from the University of Oregon.

"We found ourselves a quiet spot, put on our Arctic sleeping bags and

went to sleep. The ground was a little hard and we awakened about two o'clock and had a can of beans. Then we went back to sleep."

Surrounded

Until 8 a. m. that is. They awakened to find themselves surrounded by three gardeners, two workmen, two policemen and a detective. The detective was collarless, sleepy-eyed and astounded.

"He asked us, 'do you know where you are?' and we said, 'just at random, 'St. James' park, isn't it?' and he said no. It certainly wasn't, and after that everything got a little confused," said McCall, a graduate student at Yale.

"Before the Black Maria came," said Jensen, "we had a good look around. I can't say we enjoyed the ride to Scotland Yard, although the officials were very nice to us and let us go once we convinced them there were no bombs in our sleeping bags."

Scotland Yard confirmed the bare facts of their story but kept an embarrassed silence about the details, although one official confided: "I wouldn't have believed it possible—the palace is so well protected. It has never happened before."

Jensen and McCall, handsome six-footers, have been in England ten days, preparatory to touring Europe on a motorcycle. "We thought we'd see something of the world before our money runs out and we have to start playing at being grown up," McCall explained.

Sale of Timber, Klamath Indian Reservation, Crooked Creek Sugar Pine Unit. Sealed bids, in duplicate, on forms provided therefor, marked outside. "Bid, Crooked Creek Sugar Pine Unit" and addressed to the "Superintendent, Klamath Indian Agency, Klamath Agency, Oregon," will be received until 2:00 o'clock P. M., Pacific Standard time, on July 1, 1947, for the purchase of merchantable sugar pine timber, estimated to be about two million (2,000,000) feet, B. M. more or less, on a tract within the Klamath Indian Reservation, Oregon, described as the "Crooked Creek Sugar Pine Unit." The unit includes approximately 1800 acres of timbered land. A possible small amount of sugar pine may be found on included adjacent lands, for which separate approved contracts must afterward be made with allottees desiring to sell, and on terms similar to the contract for the unadvised timber. Each bid must state the price per thousand feet B. M. Northern Decadal C. Log Scale that will be paid for timber cut and staked prior to any readjustment of rates as specified in the contract. No bid will be considered for less than \$2.00 per thousand feet B. M. for sugar pine timber. Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check in the amount of \$100.00 on a solvent bank payable to the Special Disbursing Agent, Klamath Agency, Oregon. The deposit will be returned to unsuccessful bidders. Swan Island Case Dropped

PORTLAND, Ore., June 27 (AP)—A quarter of a million dollar back-pay suit against the Kaiser Swan Island shipyard here was dismissed Thursday by Federal Judge Claude McCullough who said the congressional portal-to-portal pay act deprived the court of jurisdiction.

Quarrels at the shipyard sought pay for one-half hour daily for three years, contending they were required to report early for assignments and inspection and were not paid for that time.

The court held there was no contract, custom or practice for payment under the circumstances.

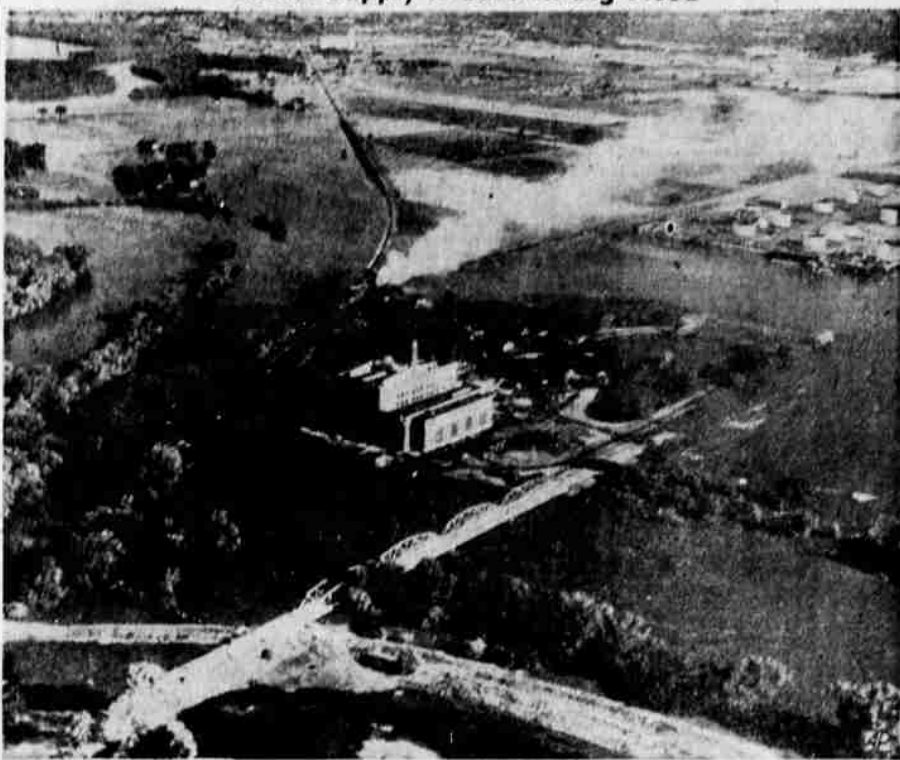

China To Get Surplus Ammunition

WASHINGTON, June 27 (AP)—The United States has agreed to turn over to China 30,000,000 pounds of surplus rifle ammunition for weapons of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek's troops.

State department officials also told reporters that the National government has been authorized to purchase other military supplies from American private manufacturers.

On the question of economic aid for the hard-pressed nationalist government, the export-import bank announced it will consider lending money to China for specific projects.

Loan Earmarked
William C. Martin, bank chairman, said an earmark of \$500,000,000 in funds for China will be allowed to expire June 30. However, the new promise of aid for specific projects leaves the door open for Chinese borrowing, either by government agencies or private enterprises.

Inability of China to settle its internal troubles and the resulting civil war were reported largely responsible for its failure to nail down any loans out of the funds which were earmarked 14 months ago.
