

# US Charges Yugos With Using Force

LAKE SUCCESS, June 27 (AP)—The United States today charged Yugoslavia, Albania and Bulgaria with using force against Greece and advocated employment of United Nations counter force is necessary.

The American position was stated by the security council by Warren R. Austin, chief U. S. delegate, as debate began on the voluminous report of the UN Balkan investigating committee.

Austin told the council that it may have to resort to counter-measures of the strongest possible kind if Yugoslavia, Albania and Bulgaria continued "using force against the territorial integrity and political independence of Greece."

Call on Council

Under the UN charter the council may call upon members of the world peace organization to make available whatever forces are needed to preserve peace, pending creation of the permanent UN global police force, which now is under consideration.

Representatives of Greece, Albania, Bulgaria and Yugoslavia sat at the council table as Austin spoke. They were called upon immediately to state the case of their governments.

Vassili Dendramis, Greek ambassador to Washington, told the council that the actions of the three northern neighbor countries were part of a plan to set up "a communist dictatorship" in Greece.

"It is the most reprehensible kind of breach of the peace," he declared. "It is aggression."

A plastic harmonica of only five parts, instead of the conventional 80, has been devised.

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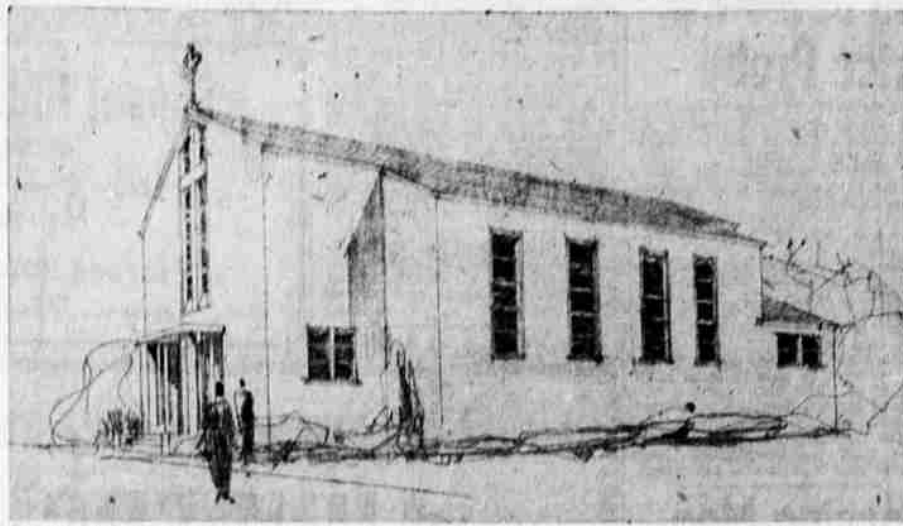

## Ground Broken For Church

With the blessing and breaking of ground for the proposed Catholic church of Dorris, Calif., June 25, plans for the construction of the church were one step nearer completion.

Bishop Robert Armstrong of Sacramento, accompanied by his aide, Father Bennett, arrived in Dorris for the ceremony. He was greeted by communicants of the church, the altar society, the building committee and other guests. A luncheon honoring the bishop was held at the Dorris Lodge cafe following a noon meeting in the city hall.

Others who were present were the Rev. Father Robidoux of Weed, Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Rickbell and Mrs. Irene Hamel of Klamath Falls, Mrs. George Gerber and Mrs. J. T. Deeter of Macdoel, and two members of the sisters' order.

Plans for the edifice have been approved by the bishop's advisory committee and construction will start immediately. The building is being financed by donations, an extension fund of the Catholic church building, and a bishop's building fund. The church site was donated by the Associated Lumber and Box company of Dorris.

## Flashes Of Life

**CHINESE MILLIONAIRE**  
CLINTON, Ill., June 27 (AP)—A check for \$700,000 has been sent to Hongkong, China, to Miss Vella M. Wilcox, the amount of her share of a Clinton woman's estate.

The check in United States currency was mailed to her by the Dewitt county treasurer, finally settling the estate of Martha E. Hall. Other heirs received their shares five years ago but the war made it impossible to send the money to Miss Wilcox in China.

When she gets the check she'll have \$7,000,000—in Chinese money.

## Trains Delayed At Summit

EUGENE, June 27 (AP)—Three trains carrying approximately 700 passengers to Eugene and points north were delayed nearly four hours today after freight cars loaded with newsprint were derailed at Cascade Summit last night.

The first of the trains is expected to reach here at noon, normally scheduled to arrive at 8:15 a. m. The summit, the Cascade, was held up at the first, the Beaver was delayed at Crescent Lake, along with a special carrying 150 delegates of the National Retail Grocers' association, making a sight-seeing tour of the Pacific coast.

Southern Pacific officials here said they thought only two or possibly three freight cars were derailed and that no one was injured. They said only a wheel or two on each car had left the track. Cause of the derailment had not been determined. All three passenger trains were bound for Portland from San Francisco.

## Vets Urge Action On Housing

PORTLAND, June 27 (AP)—Twenty Portland veterans, whose partly built homes have been weathering since the Oregon Construction and Sales Co., Inc., went into bankruptcy, said today they wanted red tape unraveled so they could get building started again.

C. A. Kresoff, one of the group, said he was paying \$16 a month interest on money borrowed for his house which has been 80 per cent complete for a year. Additional money on GI loans is sought, he said.

The veterans administration said its Seattle office is considering the problem.

## Washington Big Shipper

SAN FRANCISCO, June 27 (AP)—Although California is the world's largest producer of apricots, the state of Washington ranks first as the heaviest carlot shipper. Around 75 per cent of the Washington crop usually is shipped fresh whereas in California only a small portion is used in the fresh market.

In 1946, the federal-state market news service reports, Washington shipped 1248 carloads of apricots and averaged 887 in the five years prior to 1945. California was second with 897 cars in 1946 and a 5-year average of 469. Utah, Colorado, Idaho and Oregon shipped smaller amounts.

## 'Red' Purge Ousts Workers

WASHINGTON, June 27 (AP)—The state department announced today that "at least ten" of its employees have been fired recently because of suspected disloyalty to the United States government.

Press Officer Lincoln White described it as "a very recent action." While told reporters he was unable to furnish additional details but it was understood the employees were dismissed under congressional authority granted to the state department in its 1947 appropriations.

A clause introduced by Senator McMarran (D-Nev.) gave the secretary of state "absolute discretion" to discharge any worker "whenever he shall deem such termination necessary or advisable in the interest of the United States."

## Alaska Said Over-Advertised

PORTLAND, Ore., June 27 (AP)—Col. John P. Johnson, general manager of the Alaska railroad, thinks Alaska has been over-advertised.

"The territory is certainly our last frontier," he told the Portland chamber of commerce foreign trade and shipping department last night, "but I am of the opinion that it has been over-advertised."

"There are as many as 300 persons a day coming in, many of them not equipped or prepared for what they meet. Some are selling their furniture to get by, and I am afraid that some of them may freeze to death next winter because of the serious lack of housing."

# Travel In State Said On Upswing

Travel in Oregon, as indicated by tourist requests for information and accommodations, is approximately 15 per cent above last year, and from present indications, the 1947 volume of travel will far surpass that of any previous year in this state, according to the Oregon State Motor association.

"Regular recreation travel accommodations have been operating at capacity for the past several weeks and private accommodations are now being thrown open to care for the influx of tourists," the association reported.

"Requests for information on roads, recreation resources and travel accommodations from out-of-state travelers are reaching the association office at the rate of 50 a day."

Association officials said the increased travel flow into Oregon was an indication of the appeal of mountain, beach and other recreational and vacation resources of this state. Requests for road information indicates many out-of-state tourists wish to visit the vacation areas off the principally traveled highways, it was declared.

## Spectacular Crash Injures Four

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 27 (CP)—Four persons were in hospital here today following a spectacular accident in South Vancouver last night when a fire truck, rushing to a fire, collided with an automobile. Fireman Eric Robinson was trapped beneath the heavy ladder truck. The automobile was thrown 30 feet, landing on the sidewalk.

Only Robinson, with chest and head injuries, was reported badly hurt. The fire was extinguished.

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**West Gets Water Fund**  
WASHINGTON, June 27 (AP)—The house appropriations committee recommended today more than \$11,000,000 for water projects in Oregon and Washington during the fiscal year starting July 1.

A rivers and harbors work allocation of \$3,037,000 was recommended for McNary dam. This includes \$3,000,000 in new money and a \$37,000 carry over from this year's appropriation.

For Washington the committee allotted \$448,000 to the Mud mountain project, \$850,000 and \$205,000 carry over to the Tacoma project and \$202,000 for work on the Yalima project.
