One of the famous names in American music is that of Red Nichols who brings his "Five Pennies" to the Merrill community hall Wednesday night, 9 p. m. to 1 a. m., under the sponsorship of Baldy Evans.

Nichols has given a boost up the ladder to such famous outstanding figures as Benny Goodman, Jimmy and Tommy Dorsey, Miff Mole, Charlie and Jack Teagarden, Artie Shaw, Gene Krupa and Glen Miller. The records he has made with these people as members of his Five Pennies have become valuable additions to record collections.

From 1936 to 1943 Red either fronted his own band or played as a leader in some other well known band. He reorganized his Five Pennies, now numbering eight, in 1943. Besides being a guest on many radio programs, he has just finished a year's engagement at the Club Morocco in Hollywood.
