

Braves Assume National Lead

Tigers Back In American Running As Newhouser Continues Hold On Browns

Detroit's tough luck Tigers are back in the running today mainly on account of Hal Newhouser's inexplicable jinx over the St. Louis Browns.

Muddy Ruel's cellar dwellers bowed to Newhouser's southpaw slants for the 15th straight time yesterday as the Tigers took both ends of the doubleheader 7-5 and 6-1.

In winning their fourth straight at home, the injury-riddled Bengals climbed into a third place tie with the Philadelphia Athletics.

Paul (Dizzy) Trout hung up his seventh triumph in the nightcap before he retired in the sixth inning with a sore arm. Alton Benton allowed a hit in three innings.

Bob Elliott drove in the winning run in the first game and was the batting star of the second as the Boston Braves beat the Phils twice, 8-7 in 10 innings and 4-2.

The twin victory enabled the Braves to move into first place in the National League pennant race, a half game ahead of the Brooklyn Dodgers who split with the Giants in New York.

Although Jackie Robinson enjoyed his best day as a major leaguer, the Dodgers could not get better than a split with the Giants before 52,147 fans at the Polo Grounds. Brooklyn won the first 4-3 and lost the second 9-8. Robby drove in the tying run with a ninth inning single in the opener and scored the winning run on Arky Vaughan's pinch single after he had stolen second.

The negro flash got four hits in five times at bat in the second game to extend his hitting streak to 16 consecutive games.

Cincinnati and St. Louis split a twin bill, the Reds winning the opener 9-7 after piling up an 8-1 lead and the Cards coming back to bury Cincinnati 17-3 in the second game. Enos Slaughter, the Cards' star left fielder, drove in 10 runs, seven in the second game.

Kirby Higbe won his 100th major league game when he leached the Pittsburgh Pirates to a 10-4 win over the Cubs in Chicago.

Boston fandom, overjoyed at the Braves' climb into first place in the National League, was somewhat sobered by the Red Sox' double setback at the hands of the Athletics 3-2 and 6-5. Ted Williams banded his 13th four-bagger for the Red Sox in the final.

Four Chicago White Sox hurlers held the Cleveland Indians to four hits to register a 4-3 victory in the opener of a scheduled doubleheader. The second game was postponed by rain.

The Yankees and Senators split a doubleheader in Washington, the Nats winning the opener 5-1 and the Yankees taking the second game 3-1.

Sons Slam Indians For 15 To 4 Victory

Given a first inning unearned run to start with, the Klamath Sons turned on the basish power later in the game yesterday at Recreation field to decimate the Yreka Indians 15 to 4. It was the second time this season the Sons have slammed the Indians around. Opening day the score was 15-7.

The loss was an unhappy one for Jimmie West and Joe Derrah, who went to play for Yreka after being dropped from the local nine's roster. West had some bad breaks behind him but pitched fairly good ball until the Sons found the range in the third inning.

Frannie Miller went the route for Klamath, notching his third win, and Glyde Carstrom, appointed manager of the squad for the day, had a big time, getting three hits, had a home run over the right center wall with two aboard.

Klamath took one run in the first frame, unearned. Earl Brooks walked, was sacrificed, and Martin went to third on an out. Bart Golbar walked and lit out for second on the first pitch. Derrah's thrown down was wide and Brooks came home.

The third heat was a nightmare for West. Jim Bocchi got all the way to second on Jack Morgan's double error of his roller, and Mario Pisan lashed a grounder through Ernie Hockaday's legs at second for a double, scoring Bocchi. Tognoli bounced past third, scoring Pisan.

Golbar filed out and Ernie Bishop walked; Hi Hatfield singled to center, scoring Tognoli, and Carstrom hit his homer to open the home half of the sixth and Earl Brooks singled him home. The ball got away in center field and Brooks went to third. Then came one of the shining plays of the day. Mario Pisan filed high to McKnight in left field and McKnight's throw to Derrah was right on the mark and caught Brooks coming into home plate.

The seventh inning finished Jimmie West. With Golbar on, result of a walk, and two out, Carstrom popped to the territory back of second, a ball at least three Indians should have had, but it dropped in safe for a single. A miscue if not an error, Miller lined a hit to right and Casey Jones let the ball get away long enough for two runs to score and Miller got to third.

The eighth inning was the longest hit of the day, a triple that landed a few feet to the left of the flag pole in deep center, scoring Miller. Brooks singled, scoring Bocchi and West was taken out. Paul Dunham took up the relief work and fanned Pisan.

Yreka came through with two consecutive singles to start the eighth but the rally came to nothing.

In the last of the eighth Tognoli walked. Golbar got a single to center. Bishop bounced out. Hatfield was safe and Tognoli scored when Hi's grounder was bobbed at third, and Gordy LoScalzo cleaned the bases with a triple that should have been fielded on the hop out in right.
