

Golfers Ignore Chicago Money

Five Grand Guarantee To Bobby Locke Has Irked Some First-Water U. S. Linksmen

CHICAGO, July 1 (AP)—Some of the better known pros now think there's not enough glitter in them thar hills, partner, and are giving up prospecting at golf's gold rush—the \$36,000 Tam O'Shanter tournament.

Maybe Promoter George S. May, frequently called the King Midas of golf, is losing his touch, for the best attraction he has to offer at the moment for his four-day jamboree starting Thursday is Bobby Locke.

The sensational South African was "guaranteed" \$5000 by May to make the Tam his first appearance in Chicago, thus skipping the British National, whose proceeds went to benefit wounded U. S. veterans. If this move set golf circles buzzing in Britain, it blew hot air among many of the pros in this country.

No such guarantees were offered Ben Hogan and Jimmy Demaret, the leading money winners. They insist the reason they are bypassing the Tam extravaganza—world's richest despite nearly a 50 per cent reduction from the 1946 prize list—is May's two separate purses which award twice as much swag to leaders wearing identifying numbers than those who refused to enter the carnival spirit.

Yank Rookie Racing With Loop's Best

Frank Shea Beats Red Sox For 10th

Rookie Righthander Frank Shea of the New York Yankees, who not long ago was unofficially tabbed as the best freshman hurler of the major leagues, today challenged Bob Feller of Cleveland and Hal Newhouser of Detroit as well as his own teammate Spud Chandler for the designation as the number one pitcher of the American league.

Shea last night gained his 10th victory against only two defeats when he defeated the American league champion Red Sox in Boston 3-1.

Shea, whose three shutout victories rank him behind only Feller and Walter Masterson of Washington in that department, has allowed more than three runs in a game only once. That was a 9-6 victory over the same Red Sox. His two defeats were by the narrowest of margins, a 1-0 loss to the Red Sox in which he allowed only three hits and a 3-2 defeat by the Chicago White Sox in 10 innings. Three times he has topped Newhouser in pitching duels.

Joe Dobson, biggest winner on the Red Sox, was Shea's opposing moundman yesterday but a two-run triple by Joe DiMaggio in the first inning got Jughandle Joe off on the wrong foot. The victory enabled Shea to lead the league, leading Yankees to open up a five and a half game bulge over the second place Sox.

The Brooklyn Dodgers, led by their new home run slugger Pee Wee Reese, their new outfielder Arky Vaughan and their new cleanup clouter Carl Furillo, downed the Phils in Philadelphia 7-4 to move within two percentage points of the National league leading Boston Braves.

Reese, Vaughan and Furillo baged three hits apiece, one of Reese's being his ninth home run. Ewell (The Whip) Blackwell, Cincinnati's no-hit pitcher, recovered from a poor start to register his 11th straight and 19th victory of the season as his mates came from behind to defeat the Chicago Cubs in Cincinnati 6-4. Eddie Lukan hit his sixth home run for the Reds off Johnny Schmitz who went down to his 11th defeat.

The Chicago White Sox spotted Detroit a 5-0 lead in the second inning and then came on to defeat the Tigers 6-5 in Chicago on Luke Applegate's eighth inning home run off Hal White.

Washington emerged the victor in a see-saw battle with the Philadelphia Athletics, winning 8-7 with a three-run cluster in the last of the ninth.
