

Marshall Urges More Information

WASHINGTON, July 2 (AP)—Secretary of State Marshall urged senators today to approve in this session of congress legislation to expand a foreign information program which he termed "vital to the success of our foreign policy."

Marshall told a senate foreign relations subcommittee that unless the senate acts on legislation authorizing such a program, the state department will face "serious handicaps" abroad.

Rep. Mundt (R-S. D.), author of the house-passed measure now before the committee, also urged speedy action. He told the senators that "Russians and others are spreading malicious lies about us every day."

Republican leaders have indicated they may pigeonhole the Mundt bill until January and rely on a \$13,470,000 appropriation passed by the senate to carry on the cultural program, including the shortwave radio "Voice of America" broadcasts.

Marshall told the committee that the senate-approved appropriations figure is too small, representing only about one-half of the money that President Truman originally requested.

"This sum will certainly not enable the department to carry on the information activities at a level which our embassies abroad consider to be essential," the secretary said in a prepared statement read to the committee.

Without mentioning any foreign country, Marshall complained that the policies and actions of the United States are "often misunderstood and misrepresented abroad."

New Research Firm Founded

SEATTLE, July 2 (AP)—Former United States Sen. Hugh B. Mitchell announced today the formation of a firm of consultants on questions of Pacific Northwest economic research, public relations and industrial relations and said he would not be associated with the Seattle Star as editorial director, as announced by Sheldon F. Sackett recently.

Herbert Roback and Harold G. Tipton, both war veterans, will work with him.

Weddings Win Figure Race

The month of June, traditional month for the chiming of wedding bells, saw a total of 40 marriage licenses issued by the Klamath county clerk, setting a better pace than the divorce mill in circuit court could follow.

Decrees handed down during the month numbered 35.

In addition the circuit clerk filed 29 suits for divorce, one for annulment and one for separate maintenance under a little-used segment of Oregon's divorce law. Separate maintenance is not a divorce, but merely a legal parting of the ways.

although the principals remain officially married.

Twenty-eight of the 29 divorce complaints charged cruel and inhuman treatment, one charged desertion for a year, and the annulment petition was based on grounds that a prior divorce for the husband was not final when he remarried.

Of the divorce decrees, 27 went to wives, only eight to husbands.

GP Man Gets Life Term

Charles Samuels, 47, indicted several months ago on a charge of larceny, pleaded guilty to habitual criminal proceedings in circuit court late yesterday and was sentenced to spend the rest of his life in the Oregon state prison at Salem.

District Attorney Clarence A. Humble, following a law which makes it mandatory to bring repeated offenses under the state's habitual criminal act, told Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg that Samuels had been convicted five times previously for burglary and larceny.

The man was very nervous as he stood up with his attorney, Clayton Burrell, for the sentence, and conferred with Burrell excitedly for several minutes when the habitual criminal law was invoked.

A few minutes before, his 54-year-old brother, John William Samuels, who was convicted of larceny by a jury Monday, received a two-year sentence, also under the habitual criminal act. It was his second offense.

Charles Samuels was due to come to trial July 11, but after his brother was convicted he decided to reverse his former plea of not guilty. The brothers, who live in Grants Pass, were accused of stealing a small motor from a Merrill ranch.

They will be taken to Salem to begin their sentences tomorrow morning.
