Policemen Face Charge

PORTLAND, July 2 (P)—Police Chief L. V. Jenkins today weighed evidence before pronouncing sentence on two city jailers convicted of neglect of duty the night Albert W. Love, 85, Portland, died in the jail's "drunk tank."

A disciplinary board of police captains, which found the jailers guilty, recommended leniency for the pair, Robert A. Vancil and R. T. Schmidt, on the ground they were new at their jobs. The maximum penalty is dismissal from the force.

Four other policemen, who brought Love to the jail June 26 after he was found unconscious on a sidewalk, were absolved of charges, although the board suggested they be reprimanded for "lack of judgment."

An autopsy blamed a skull fracture and a brain hemorrhage for his death.

Carpenters Turn Down Pay Boost

SEATTLE, July 2 (P)—Roy W. Atkinson, regional CIO director, today commended the action of Skagit-Whatcom-San Juan County AFL carpenters in waiving a 13-cent hourly pay raise to which it was entitled under a cost-of-living clause.

"It's a sensible step, a step in the right direction," Atkinson commented.

Other labor leaders also expressed approval of the action. E. M. Weston, president of the Washington State Federation of Labor, said the workers "evidently believe it is better to have a job at which they can work every day at a rate people can afford to pay."

He added, however, that it "is a question whether it can be an effective action when it is limited just to the Skagit district."

"It took a job at which they can work every day at a rate people can afford to pay," commented Harry Carr, president of the Seattle building trades council.

No Spud Support Asked By Growers

PORTLAND, July 2 (P)—Not a potato grower in Multnomah, Morrow or Malheur counties applied for government price support protection for the intermediate crop to be harvested this month, the department of agriculture reported today.

The deadline for applications fell yesterday and the department of agriculture contrasted it with last year, when 375 carloads of intermediate crop potatoes were purchased in Malheur county at support price of \$1.70 a hundred.

The deadline for applications on late crop potatoes is September 1.
