Some of the toughest bucking broncs of Mack Barbour's rodeo stock will try their sunfishin' tricks at the three-day Klamath Basin rodeo. "Warpaint," the Pinto bucking horse, will be there along with "Golden Rule," another tough brute with a wicked reputation, and "Baldy Downs," famous old bronc which is seldom ridden.

Three green Brahma bulls, "Tojo," "Sleepy" and "Sharkie," new to the game and never ridden, are fixin' to stay that way. They borrowed their names from bulls of recent years, but they'll make their debut and their own reputations on the 4th, 5th and 6th of July, at the Klamath county fairgrounds.

Bull-dogging steers are big, tough and hard to throw this year, with experience in wearing a man down until there's no use clocking his time.

A bunch of Arizona wranglers have come all the way from the land of alkal and gila monsters, attracted by the purses at the K. B. rodeo. Asberry Schel of Coolidge and John Rhodes of Tucson, who just won the team roping event at the Salinas, Calif., rodeo, have signed up for the same event here. Both are former champs of this fete.

Orville Thomas of Phoenix, Ariz., with top money from the bull-dogging at the Yreka rodeo last weekend, will compete against such famous turtles as Carroll Brunton, Poe valley rancher, top roper and bull-dogger, and Vic Castro of Richmond, Calif., who takes money from this basin show each year.
