Reparations End Proposed

WASHINGTON, July 3 (AP)—A house foreign affairs subcommittee, frankly pessimistic over future Russian cooperation, raised today the possibility of United States insistence upon ending current reparations from Germany and Japan. In a formal report, the subcommittee estimated that Europe's dollar deficit for its requirements for the three-year period 1947 through 1949, would reach approximately \$19,000,000,000. The figure did not include the needs of Russia or those of the East.

Urging formulation of a broad program for Europe's "healthy economic recovery," the committee declared that Germany and Japan cannot be made self-supporting without "tremendous American help."

"If we are to make this help productive, we should have to insist on putting an end to current reparations and on cutting down the earlier punitive programs or reparations aimed at weakening or destroying Germany and Japan, and to set new levels of industry that would enable Germany and Japan to balance their own needs for imports and create export surplus which we could direct into the rebuilding of the rest of Europe and the necessary reconstruction of the Far East."

Juveniles Back In Custody Again

The two lads, aged 11 and 13, who escaped from the county juvenile cottage last Monday while out berry-picking, were located by city police late yesterday and are back in juvenile custody.

The boys admitted breaking into half a dozen houses and one car during their two days of freedom, and stealing about \$90 in money and a number of other small articles.

They said they spent the money during a visit to a carnival.

Man Injured By Bulldozer Blade

Lee Hague, 26, of Fort Klamath, is in Hillside hospital recovering from slight injuries sustained when the flat side of a bulldozer blade struck him in the back Wednesday afternoon.

Hague was underneath the machine when the blade fell, the flat side striking him. Hospital attendants say he is suffering from bruises. He was brought to Klamath Falls by Klamath Ambulance Service.

Woman Held For Forgery

SEATTLE, July 3 (AP)—Laurence E. Albert, supervising agent of the U. S. secret service here, today announced the arrest in Juneau, Alaska, of Mrs. Walter A. Kress on a warrant charging she forged and passed 21 government allowance checks totaling \$1612.

Albert said she cashed checks made out to her foster daughter, Alice Jones, wife of a soldier serving overseas when the checks were cashed.

The foster daughter did not know of the checks until she met her husband in California on his return in 1945.

Albert added that Mrs. Kress cashed the checks in Washington and Oregon and during the period of the forgeries lived in Vancouver, Everett and Seattle. She probably will be taken to Tacoma for prosecution.
